 \mathbf{W} elcome to issue 105 of the EIC, the summer special!

I hope you are all safe and well, and have been coping in the extreme heat we have been having recently. I do love the sun, it makes everything so much brighter and happier! But as a mama to two Border Terriers their welfare is my priority at the

moment, so v. early walks or v. late walks for them, and only after I've taken my own shoes off and walked on the tarmac to make sure I don't hurt their paws! Lots of water, a cooling mat, plenty of shade, cold tea towels and limiting car journeys to 'essential ones' only. Who needs foreign climes when this is on our doorstep!

It has been a busy few months for the Parish Council, we are currently undergoing the external auditing for the accounts 2020 to 2021. The Public Notification of the Inspection of accounts is still underway, to be concluded at the end of the month and then we should receive our report from them. The results will be discussed at the next parish council meeting.

We got the go ahead with the 'Let's Get Active' fund from WBC, they are happy with the proposed Gaelic Football nets (half football / half rugby), and also the new permanent Table Tennis table! Money should be received from WBC and The Good Exchange / Greenham Common Trust this week so we will place the orders and get that kit installed as soon as possible.

The soil and silt testing has been done at the Pond, a lovely 32 page report has been compiled which we are all going through, but so far, it is looking good for the excavation to take place at the very end of August / early September once the harvest has been gathered. We will give you exact dates as soon as we know them as it will be a bit manic down at the pond during the works.

As you know, we have returned to face to face meetings (despite rising cases of the Delta variant), since the UK Government decided to end the legal allowance of remote meetings on 6th May (thanks guys ②). We have been unable to use the school hall due to a 'bubble' using it as classroom space but we have been very happy and contented at the Crown and Horns (thanks guys ③). From September we should be back in the hall, but are awaiting clarification from the school to set this up.

We were delighted to be able to put on a special 'thank you' afternoon tea for the village Emergency Response Team (more on that later). For some of us, it was the first time we had actually met face to face since we started working together and it was a real treat and a glorious afternoon.

So what is coming up for us over the next couple of months? My playground officer, Brendan, has sadly resigned from the parish council due to work commitments and I will (and the rest of the PC) miss him dearly. He has been instrumental with the changes up at the playground and we are really proud of everything he did. We are now in a period of 'casual vacancy' where the parish can call a by-election to fill the space (if WBC receive more than 10 requests) by 3rd August. If we don't, then post 3rd August we can co-opt someone into this vacant seat.

Pirbright is back (up to 185 houses) and we will be working on our response. This brings traffic management to the fore once again so expect to see a few meetings covering that issue. A Pen Meadow 'drop in' session will be planned for a Saturday afternoon (just awaiting confirmation dates with the developers), the war memorial for Rex Wells will be unveiled and of course, playground and pond projects are go! Wow, I'll need a holiday... (my back garden probably) after all that!

Farriers Lane Private Footpath



17 months ago, when we were plunged into our first lock down, exercise for 1 hour outside of your house was allowed. This meant lots of people and families started walking more around the village, using the network of footpaths that navigate in and around the village.

There is one footpath in the village that received a surge in activity during this time, but did you know that this is actually a 'private' footpath?

It is situated at the very top of Farriers Lane (off Abingdon Road) and is tucked away between a hedge and a private driveway. It was installed at the same time as the housing development was constructed and the title deeds of the properties reference the 'private' footpath. It was put in for the sole use of Farriers Lane residents to easily access the Ridgeway, rather than walk down along Abingdon Road and up the footpath at the end.

However, many more non-residents of Farriers Lane have been using this footpath when actually it is private property. We are respectfully requesting that all non-residents of Farriers Lane refrain from using this private footpath and instead head down Abingdon Road to use the network there.

Signs have been put up to notify people of this but they have been ignored (or removed without permission!). There are privacy issues at stake here and also increasing damage to private driveways that are proving a nightmare to fix.

Please do take heed of this advice. The Parish Council are working with the residents of Farriers Lane to help them and we ask that you do follow these instructions. If you have any questions please call or email the Parish Clerk (details on the back page).

The Parish Council are delighted that a small flock of sheep have returned to the common field! Prestwell Field (in between Sunrise Hill and the Allotments) is a site of special interest and is home to some exciting examples of wildflowers, home to three horses and is a great space to walk and take in the views.

The sheep have been brought in to munch away at the scrub grasses that have grown wild due to the wet weather, closely followed by blazing sunshine and we need their help to bring this back under control

The shepherd, Ben, delivered the sheep over the weekend of 17th and 18th July and their munching will be assessed until the desirable levels have been achieved. Huge thanks to Ben for bringing them to us and thanks to Mr Nick Watkins and Mr Julian Jeffs for allowing Ben and the Parish Council to use their grazing rights during this time.

As with all livestock, if you are up there with dogs, please ensure they are secured on a lead, and not allowed to run free up there whilst the sheep are there. We appreciate your help with making sure the sheep are safe and happy up there in their temporary home!



Footpaths! With more and more people out and about, you have probably all seen the overgrown vegetation across the network of footpaths that are managed by West Berkshire Council. All villages have suffered this summer with extreme rain and extreme heat, meaning optimum growth and the spread of weeds, grasses, and nettles. Not only is this unsightly, but it is sometimes impossible to pass, to be able

to keep an eye on kids and dogs, and to make it through safely without getting stung on the legs!

Our eyes on the ground (you dear readers) are sometimes the only people who spot when this is getting out of control and this allows us to report the problem on the WBC portal. Brilliant in practice, annoying because every single other village in West Berkshire are doing exactly the same, and they just don't have the man power to do everything at once. Please be assured that every issue reported to us is immediately logged with WBC and we are added to a 'round'. We just end up having to wait for the team to be scheduled to East Ilsley for the work to be done.

You may know that the Parish Council own a 'brush cutter' and a few people have been trained to use it. We rely solely on these trained volunteers to get the equipment out and strim down what they can when WBC are so overwhelmed. This, however, leaves us with the problem of what to do with all the cuttings and they just get left, causing more mess. At least WBC remove the cuttings, leaving a clear right of way for people to use.

We will add this to the agenda for the meeting in September, for now, please keep reporting them to <u>clerk@eastilsley-pc.gov.uk</u> or visit <u>https://www.westberks.gov.uk/reportaproblem</u> and log it yourself if you want to save time. All the requests go to the same place for processing.



The 2023 Review of Parliamentary constituencies was formally launched in January 2021.

Due to population changes since the last review, the number of electors in some constituencies is much higher than in others. The Boundary Commission for England (BCE) is required by legislation to ensure that the number of electors in each constituency is more equal; in doing so, the number of constituencies in England will increase from 533 to 543.

The boundary changes only relate to Parliamentary constituencies (the area an MP is elected to represent in Parliament).

The review is a redistribution of the population bracket for each division to cover. Where there has been a population shift and increase, the BCE will redraw the boundaries to ensure each constituency has (as far as possible) equal amounts of population within them, giving an extra 10 parliamentary seats in England.

Essentially, the greater impact is on MPs and not on parish and town councils. Some MPs may see their constituency split which may make them at risk at the next election. When building the parliamentary boundaries, the BCE use ward boundaries where possible, to avoid splitting up wards and affecting service provision. However, there may be cases where residents in parishes/ wards will vote for a different MP in the next election under a different area.

The review does not change local authority boundaries and will not affect the services received in or covered by the district.

As part of the review, a consultation is now running to get feedback on proposed new boundary lines and constituency names. The consultation is currently open until **Monday 2nd August 2021**. You can make comments by visiting the map and clicking "make a comment".

There will be a further two rounds of consultation in 2022, which will additionally include a number of public hearings. Following the conclusion of all three consultation periods, the Commission will look at all the evidence received and form its final recommendations. These will be presented to Parliament by July 2023 for approval, with the new constituencies taking effect at the next General Election.

News from your West Berkshire councillor. Representing West Ilsley, East Ilsley, Compton, Hampstead Norreys, Frilsham and Yattendon

Hello everyone

I'm pleased to have secured some match funding from West Berkshire Council for WiFi for the primary school and fencing for Prestwell Field. Thank you to Fen for drafting the bids. Since May 2019 I've secured £14,000 in match funding for local projects in our ward.

The Animal Health Institute/Pirbright planning application has been updated. Perhaps most significantly the landowner Homes England is proposing 'up to 185' homes. This is less than their previously proposed figure of 250, but more than the 140 homes recommended in West Berkshire Council's policy documents (HAS DPD Policy HSA23 to be precise....). At the time of writing (16th July) the deadline for comments is 29 July, but I have requested an extension because some of the documentation accompanying the updated planning application was added to the WBC website late. If you submitted comments on the previous application you do NOT need to submit them again. If you want to submit new comments I recommend doing so by 29 July to be on the safe side. If you search for West Berkshire Council planning applications online, and then put the code 20/01336/OUTMAJ into the search box you will find all the relevant documentation.

Many of us shop and socialise in Newbury, so you might be interested to know there is a masterplan about the redevelopment of Newbury and also a major planning application to redevelop the area around the Kennet Centre. These are still under discussion and the latter will go to the planning committee later in the year.

Periodically the Boundary Commission reviews the boundaries of parliamentary constituencies, to ensure they have a similar number of electors each. They have proposed that the whole of this ward, Ridgeway (West and East Ilsley, Compton, Hampstead Norreys, Frilsham and Yattendon) moves into a new constituency called Mid Berkshire. This constituency would stretch up to the boundary of Reading. There is a lively discussion going on locally about whether the whole of Ridgeway should stay in Newbury constituency, move into the new Mid Berkshire constituency, or whether just West and East Ilsley should stay in Newbury constituency. If you'd like to know more visit https://www.bcereviews.org.uk/ Deadline for comments is 2 August. Personally I don't want to see this ward split across two MPs, but your views might differ.

Concerns about pot holes, bins that didn't get emptied, flytipping, something that needs to be replaced, etc can be reported to https://www.westberks.gov.uk/reportaproblem If you are not happy with the response you receive let me know.

Thanks to Fen and the parish council for all they do for the village, and to Martyn and Liam at the Crown and Horns for all they've done to bolster community spirit during tough times.

Coronavirus (COVID-19) Update

With the change on the 19 July 2021 with respect to social distancing and the wearing of face masks, patient's that are booked into appointments at the Downland Practice will still be required to wear a face mask and observe social distancing. We need to keep the patients and staff as safe as possible. The current situation will be updated on the Downland Practice at the practice website news section www.downlandpractice.nhs.uk.

COVID-19 Vaccinations

We have had a few cases of patients who have had Covid-19 vaccination undertaken outside of the West Berkshire area, some of these cases have resulted in data not being displayed on the NHS app. Initially we were informed of a helpline that patients can ring to resolve these issues, it was not made clear at the time that this help line was for GP practices to use on behalf of patients. If there are patients who have problems viewing their covid-19 data on the NHS app please email details to pm.downland@nhs.net.

COVID-19 Vaccination Booster Clinics

We do not have dates yet for the booster vaccinations, once we have information we will update the practice website news section www.downlandpractice.nhs.uk.

Flu Clinics - 2021

Flu clinics will start in Sep 21, patients will be able to book their flu vaccine from the end of August 2021. The Practice will concentrate on offering appointments to the over 65's, and patients who have medical conditions who are eligible for the Flu. Patients who are in the 50-64 year old group will be invited for a Flu vaccine in October 2021.

Duty Doctor

From the end of April 2021 the Duty Doctor system changed from telephone calls to face to face appointments. Patients who need to be seen on the day by a GP are given an appointment to attend the surgery. Patients may have a wait whilst the Duty Doctor deals with patients who

have an urgent clinical need. Patients are advised to ring in before 12.00 if they wish to see a GP on the day. Patients who are offered a Duty Doctor Appointment but refuse the appointment will have this recorded in their medical records. This system is working well and is preventing GP's from having to use two appointments (telephone call, then a face to face) with the same patient for on the day needs.

GP Routine Appointments

From June 2021 all GP routine appointments will be offered as face to face appointments. Patients will be sitting in socially distanced waiting area and when the waiting area is full patients will need to wait outside till there is space available. The check in screens are now back in operation, please use the hand cleanser after booking in for your appointment.

Downland Volunteer Group (DVG)

The DVG operates from the Compton site from 09.30-11.30 Mon - Fri and provides transport for patients who have no other means of travel. In 2019 close to 1,000 journeys were undertaken by the DVG, they are now open for business but we need your help. We are short of drivers across the area, if there is anybody out there who can help to take patients to their appointments this will be appreciated. There is a reimbursement scheme for fuel in place. We also urgently need some admin staff to cover the phone at the DVG office in Compton, if you would like to help out please either ring 01635 578394 or email pm.downland@nhs.net

Pharmacy Disruption June/July 2021

The Pharmacy has been undergoing some planned infrastructure work in June/July 2021. This involved the Pharmacy moving into a temporary accommodation that was situated in the surgery car park. This period has been fairly smooth in terms of service from the Pharmacy, the staff have worked really hard to keep up to date with patient's repeat medication requests. During this time the pharmacy telephone has been off of the practice phone system and the reception staff have been unable to put calls through to the pharmacy. Normal service at the pharmacy resumes on the 19 July 2021.

From 19 July 2021, patients who want to contact the pharmacy need to phone the surgery and select the option for the pharmacy. There is no direct phone line available for patients to phone the Compton site, patients who wish to contact the Compton site need to ring 01635 248251 and select the pharmacy option.

enabled expert tour guide, Sarah Slater, to give a fascinating talk on the ghosts of Hampton Court Palace at the June meeting. She was dressed in a Victorian mourning gown (circa 1880) complete with bustle. Sarah has worked at the palace for thirteen years and has learnt and experienced much in that time.

We were treated to a brief history of the palace which was given to Henry VIII by Cardinal Wolsey. William III stopped living there when he bought Buckingham House, which consequently became known as Buckingham Palace, and has been the London home of the monarchy ever since. He had part of the palace demolished and the newer half of the present building was designed by Sir Christopher Wren. Hampton Court Palace was let as Grace and Favour apartments after that.

Sarah explained that there are a variety of ghosts which are apparitions of a dead person seen by the living. They are a lost soul that has not moved into light. Hauntings are energies from a past event. Ghost stories have been told for hundreds of years and most come from people who have lived in the palace.

From the Tudor royal nurse who is said to haunt her former lodgings, to the peculiar sighting of a mysterious figure, captured by the palace security cameras only a few years ago, Hampton Court Palace has witnessed a host of spooky sightings across the centuries. Queen Katherine Howard is said to roam the 'Haunted Gallery', whilst her predecessor, Queen Jane Seymour, is said to haunt the palace's courtyards, looking for her lost son.

After dark, Hampton Court Palace is eerie and atmospheric, and we thought it would be a good idea to join a guided ghost tour in the near future.

What a difference a year makes!

Remember last summer? COVID and Lockdown taught us to value nature, gave us time to 'be', saved us money and encouraged us towards simpler lifestyles. Look at us now - we're back on our treadmills, anxious to know if we will holiday abroad this year, spending our savings like there's no tomorrow and generally rushing through our lives whilst not actually living them!

Of course, being freely out and about again has its rewards! I for example, shall thoroughly enjoy being able to visit National Trust properties once more. I so often find myself appreciating the love that went into their design and construction and the amount of love and work it now takes to maintain them. It got me thinking about our own local 'ancient monuments' – our village churches. Some of our local church buildings are more than 700 years old! Like the buildings cared for by the NT, they carry the stories of all those who have come before us in their stones; those who aspired to their creation and others who made the dream a reality. They represent the things about life that stay the same even when modern living and its penchant for constant change threaten to overwhelm us.

But like the love, time, money and hard work that get poured into a new NT acquisition, we very often assume that our parish churches are 'somebody else's problem' to solve. Actually, they are ours! And just like the NT, despite the professionals it pays to bring expertise to bear on restoration and upkeep, it is the volunteers that make all the difference. Without volunteers our great historic buildings would not be open for us all to enjoy. Without volunteers, so many precious places would run to wrack and ruin. It's just the same for our churches! Many people assume the Church of England looks after our buildings. It doesn't! Many assume you have to be a 'paid-up believer' to offer a skill or some time to caring for our churches and their communities. You don't! But without the skills, time, love and hard work of volunteers, the future of all our churches is in peril.

Last summer, we all found ourselves in touch with something we realised we'd lost - our community. Suddenly our neighbours and their needs were important. We found time to give, share and receive from one another. What a difference a year makes!



The East IIsley Trust Fund

What is it and why does it exist?

I thought it would be useful to all the newcomers to the village to explain what the Trust Fund is and what its aims are. For many years, The Old School along the Compton Road had been used by the villagers for functions as a community hall, the Parish Council in the early 1960's attempted to buy it for the village and these discussions took place over a number of years but to no avail and the site was eventually sold for development.

Village activities carried on at the Primary School, local barns, courtesy of the local farmers or in the open air and there were several attempts to replace the lost community hall, fundraising took place, but with rising building costs, the fundraising could not keep up. The decision was taken to 'store' the funds that had accumulated and put them in 'trust' for any future community hall initiative.

It was also decided to use the interest on the invested capital for the benefit of the village by donations in support of the various groups and people in the village provided it was for the benefit of the inhabitants, and this has operated very well over the last few years, contributing funds towards equipment for the school, the village fireworks, St. Mary's Church for help with the restoration of the war memorial and the clock. The Evergreens, The Ilsley Under Fives, The Autumn Group, West Ilsley Cricket Club towards new nets, along with the Sheep Fair and the Christmas lights for the tree by the pond. We also provided the medals for the Queen's Diamond Jubilee for all the children in the village at the time.

With interest rates dropping over the last few years, we do not earn as much interest as we once did, but we are still able to support village interests when we can.

Reading's large-scale vaccination programme moves from Madejski to Broad Street Mall at the end of July

Reading's large-scale Covid-19 vaccination programme will be moving from the Madejski Stadium to Unit 49-50 at the Broad Street Mall in Reading at the end of July. The last vaccinations at the Madejski will be on July 23 and operations will resume at Broad Street Mall at the end of this month. The move has been organised by Oxford Health NHS Foundation Trust to secure a longer term and accessible venue for vaccinations for the Berkshire West population, in anticipation of a return to larger match attendances at the home of Reading FC. Vaccinations do not take place at the Madejski on match days, limiting appointment availability. At the new Broad Street Mall venue, appointments will be available seven days a week, from 8.30am to 7.30pm

Moving to step 4 of the Covid-19 road map

Following the Government's announcement, on 19th July England moved to Step 4 of the COVID19 roadmap. Adhering to government advice in healthcare settings - staff, patients, and visitors will be expected to continue wearing masks. This is to help keep everyone safe and prevent further spread of the virus. The Royal Berkshire Hospital has produced this short video from their Chief Nurse, Eamonn Sullivan Visitor number limitations will remain in place at the RBH but are being reviewed, and they hope they can allow more visitors as soon as it is safe and appropriate to do so. Keep an eye out for further announcements about this on their website and social media.

With the widespread ownership of smartphones and tablets, and the ever-increasing use of Apps, there is a real opportunity for them to effectively support you in managing health conditions or your general wellbeing. But with over 360,000 health, many of which don't have any level of quality assurance, it can be incredibly difficult to find one that's appropriate, trustworthy and effective.

ORCHA has formed a team of people, including actively practicing clinicians, to independently review and accredit health Apps against a large number of stringent criteria in areas such as clinical/professional assurance, data and privacy, and usability and accessibility; giving each App an easy to understand percentage score which will help people decide whether to download it or not. It's not expected that Apps or the library replace any services you may be using, but rather to compliment them.

Be a Research Champion! Are you passionate about how NHS, public health and social care research can transform people's lives? Do you want to encourage people to take part in studies to discover new tests and treatments?


