Tales from your Parish Clerk



Welcome issue 106 of the EIC, the autumnal edition. It is all go here at the Parish Council and I look forward to telling you all about it!

We are delighted to welcome Nick Watkins as our new Co-opted Parish Councillor. Nick was co-opted at the September meeting and already holds the post of 'Flood Warden' so we have now added 'Pond Officer' along with Cllr. Meadows to his list.

We are very much looking forward to working with Nick and we are now officially full again.

Much of my recent work has brought me 'on site' into the village as you could not have missed the exicting pond excavation that took place recently. It was both a pleasure to spend so much time in the village during that (very sunny) week and also a relief that this project has finally come to fruition. I can recall at my interview back in April 2019 that I was told about the pond and all I would have to do... It feels so long ago that we started seriously looking into the feasibility of a project on this scale and I almost need to pinch myself that we've only gone and done it! Of couse, it is not over yet. We can't ignore the 45 tonnes of silt that is sat drying out in Ian Wilson's field at the end of Haydon Lane for a start. Enormous thanks go out to Ian for allowing us the use of the field, we really would have been in a pickle without that space to use. It will take a while for it to dry out, only then can we start implementing phase 2 of the project which is to re-locate it safely. Phase 3 is the landscaping of the pond area and rather brilliantly, this can be actioned straight away, so we will be enlisting volunteers to help us with that very soon. Please be careful around the area, no one should be venturing into the pond ever, so please do not attempt to explore the area and it is now very deep!

West Berkshire Council have just released a new SID Portal (speed indicator device) and we are fully signed up to it. Pre-Covid we had a number of people trained to use the speed devices, agreed locations around the village and prepared risk assessments and we are now able to go ahead and book the devices, pending final approval from WBC. So expect to see our team out and about around the village recording data so we can report back to the council. All this data can help us push forward with speed limit reviews and other measures to help make the village a safer place to be.

Next June sees the country celebrating the Platinum Jubilee of our Queen. Plans are already underway to mark this celebration. A 'Plant a Tree for the Jubilee' campaign is something we are looking at with a potential small 'copse' of trees planted at the Recreation Ground. It is very much work in progress, but the hope is to create something that provides some shade and respite from the heat in the summer, and of course, mark the Platinum Jubilee as well.

Speaking of the playground, the Gaelic Football Goals and nets have been delivered, they are waiting patiently for installation which should be in the next couple of weeks! The Table Tennis Table is on the way as well, the manufacturer Butterfly made all the tables for the Tokyo Olympics and Paralympics this summer so as you can imagine there is a bit of a backlog!

Expect some goings on with the tree canopy along the side of the playground as well very soon, it is high time we sorted out those hanging branches, particularly with the change in season and the weather on the turn. We will keep you informed of dates as access may be limited and you will need to divert briefly around the works for safety.

That's all from me, stay safe and well, and enjoy the edition! Fen

POND EXCAVATION

20th September 2021 to 23rd September 2021

It is amazing what you can achieve in 4 days!

It has been a busy week in East IIsley... The 'Pond Project' had been a long time coming; only made possible by West Berkshire Council providing a CIL funding grant to us back in January this year.

TL Contracting were appointed as the excavators and they moved in the heavy machinery on Monday morning and work finally begun in earnest. Thankfully, they had glorious weather to work in, making a messy job all the more enjoyable in the sunshine.

The pond was drained and the digger moved in to start scraping up the silt and transfer it to the dumper truck, which then distributed the wet silt onto a nearby field. Approximately 45 tonnes of silt were removed and this is now 'drying out' until it can be transported away.

A 'safety shelf' was built, ensuring there was not a big drop from the waters edge utilitising some of the existing material.

This excavation has provided a safer future for the village in terms of flooding, and the pond is now able to manage heavy rainfall, limiting the chance of houses flooding. It is not over quite yet, the area now needs to be landscaped and very soon, it should be back to being the heart of the village and a beautiful place to stop and relax for a while.

News from your West Berkshire councillor. Representing West Ilsley, East Ilsley, Compton, Hampstead Norreys, Frilsham and Yattendon

Dear residents

I hope you have had a good summer.

At the time of writing this article (24th September) there is still no news about when the Institute planning application will be going to Western Area Planning Committee for a vote.

West Berkshire Council is introducing a new, free food waste collection service next year. Residents will be given a 23 litre kerbside bin, and a 5 litre kitchen bin. You can opt out if you have a composter at home, or if you live in a densely populated area where there isn't room to have a bin per household. The council is trying to reduce the amount of waste that goes into black bins and having food waste bins is one way of doing this. Bear in mind too that the council is collecting more kinds of plastic at the local tips than they do at the kerbside, so if you want to recycle things like plastic margarine and ice cream tubs, you can take them to the tip.

On 9th September I made a speech in the council chamber proposing that the council supports the Climate and Ecology Bill and responds positively to a public consultation about 'nature recovery networks. These are basically maps that show where all the nature reserves and green spaces are, and how they can be connected together so that wildlife can move around. They need to do this to be able to feed and breed. The idea is to prevent development cutting off all these places for nature and turning them into islands that wildlife get trapped in. Oxfordshire council and their local conservation organisations have made a map. It would be good if we could have a map for West Berkshire too.

Thank you to all the residents who responded to my message on Facebook asking for examples of how you have been helping wildlife - including letting patches of your garden grow wild, and creating homes for hedgehogs, bees, bats, and birds. Niki from the Newbury Weekly News visited East Ilsley and Compton on 24th September to see our orchard and meet Ray in Compton who has been making hedgehog, bird, and bat boxes.

I am still in discussion with WBC and the parish council about moving the wildflower turf from Sunrise Hill, so that they don't interfere with the visibility of drivers exiting from Sunrise.

Concerns about pot holes, bins that didn't get emptied, fly tipping, something that needs to be replaced, etc can be reported to https://www.westberks.gov.uk/reportaproblem - If you are not happy with the response you receive let me know.

Pringles tubes and other paper food containers with metal ends now accepted at West Berkshire Recycling Centres

West Berkshire Council, in partnership with Veolia UK and the Alliance for Beverage Cartons & the Environment (ACE UK), is launching a new recycling service for paper containers with metal ends, such as Pringles tubes, packaging used for hot chocolate, nuts and other products. Local residents can now recycle their containers alongside food and drink cartons at specialist banks at the Council's Newbury and Padworth Household Waste Recycling Centres (HWRCs) and Mini Recycling Centres (MRCs) located at Waitrose - Newbury, Sainsbury - Newbury, Station Car Park - Hungerford, Kingsland Centre - Thatcham, Hillier Garden Centre - Hermitage, and Willink Leisure Centre - Burghfield.

The new recycling service is the result of an agreement between ACE UK, which operates the dedicated food and drink carton recycling service available in West Berkshire, and packaging manufacturer Sonoco Consumer Products Europe.

Musing from the Associate Clergy - Revd. Dr. Simon Thorn



We live in very unsettling times. In March 2020, the Director General of the World Health Organisation addressing a media-briefing about the COVID-19 pandemic said: "Crises like this tend to bring out the best and worst in humanity." It may be a cliché, but it's at times like this when you find out who your true friends are.

This applies as much to a national crisis as to our own individual struggles. I'm sure we all know the disappointment of discovering someone on whom we

thought we could rely actually lets us down. The sense of abandonment is acute, the wound deep. Yet the problem is actually down to selfishness. When you have a sense of entitlement and you're always in control, you resent not having things your own way. Our parents have spent years trying to teach us not to act like spoilt children, only for us to revert to type when the going gets tough. We are tempted to sulk or, worse, take it out on others.

Our relationship with God is just the same. As we have taken his creation and his generosity for granted, we have come to think we are entitled to it all, and forever. We have gone from being faithful stewards to unjust servants.

The Earth is an extraordinary miracle of delicately balanced and finely tuned cycles. We have yet to identify another planet which has allowed life to evolve and diversify into the beautiful and complex web of Nature that we enjoy on our Earth. Our weather, our landscape, our homes, our food, our very existence depends on the balance of its natural systems. Yet, as we have seen with accelerated global warming, when we push the natural world faster that it can adapt, by emitting more greenhouse gases than can be absorbed by forests and oceans, and by overharvesting our land and seas faster than they can replenish themselves, we turn our world into a desert. And the reason for the overharvesting, the overcropping, the overproduction of goods? Pure selfishness. The focus on ourselves at the expense of our neighbour, rather than loving our neighbour as ourselves, will only lead to ruin. Every prophet in history has shouted this, for it only to fall on deaf ears.

Perhaps it's because we have become so divorced from the natural world, the seasonal challenges which farmers face in looking after their crops and animals, that Western society is in such deep denial. Perhaps it's because we are so arrogant about human ingenuity and achievement that we assume there will be a technological fix; the boffins will think of something. In the meantime, we don't have worry as we have enough coal and gas reserves and virgin rainforest to keep us going for a life-time, or at least until the next presidential or general election. Harvest Thanksgiving really should be on our minds continually when we pray 'Give us this day our daily bread.' This part of the Lord's Prayer reminds us of our dependence on God, not only for our spiritual food, but for our physical corporeal sustenance.

Farming Corner

Welcome to the first Farming Corner for the EIC.

The intention of this and future articles, is to follow the farming year as it impacts the countryside around our village. We hope to inform you of farming operations and outcomes and help you better understand



the challenges and efforts that go to manage and maintain the beautiful area in which we live.

As we go to print, the harvest is complete for 2021 and preparation for the next harvest has already started. Indeed, in August we were already planting Oil seed rape (OSR). OSR is grown as a break crop which gives the following wheat crop significant benefits. OSR is also an early crop which needs a good start before the winter sets in and also before the flea beetle can take hold. **

This harvest has not been easy, due in the main to challenging weather conditions which have slowed the progress of gathering in the crops and reduced the quality of some of the resultant produce. Unfortunately, we have also seen an upturn in mechanical failures, for which we have no rhyme nor reason why this has happened.

Around the Ilsley area we have seen a wide range of crops grown, a sample of which we have listed below with an indication of what they will be used for. Pretty much all produce is graded and the quality determines the final usage:

- Oil seed rape The crop following harvest is taken to a crushing mill and the oil extracted in much the same way as an olive. The first pressing oil will be bottled and will sit on the supermarket shelf alongside Olive Oil. Rapeseed oil can replace olive oil in the kitchen and has a higher Omega 3 level, is alleged to be better for you and grown in the UK.
- Winter Barley Typically used for malting, or animal feed
- Winter Oats This is what you will see on the breakfast table as breakfast cereal or for poorer quality crops it will become horse feed
- Winter Wheat It's good to know that some of this crop will be milled locally (Wantage) to create flour, which can then be used to make bread, biscuits, or manufacture animal feed. An interesting fact is that some Winter Wheat is used to make ethanol, which is then used as a fuel.
- Winter Beans Predominately this crop is used for animal feed, it is a source of very good protein and can therefore be used as an alternative to importing soya from other countries.
- Winter Linseed (you may have seen the blue flower) is mainly used for culinary uses or again used as a basis of animal feed.
- A by-product of all these core crops is straw, most of the straw generated locally is used as either a fuel, animal bedding, or used as environmental insulation.
- Grass yes , we did say grass! It's a vitally important crop which is grown locally for hay and used as animal feed in the form of silage or haylage (a wetter version of silage that horses prefer).
- And bringing up the rear Spring Barley, this was the last crop we have harvested, a majority of this should go for malting to create beer. Ringwood brewery have previously been purveyors of our local crop.

But the work on a farm doesn't stop there....

Post-harvest, some fields have already been lightly cultivated this is to get the weed seeds to germinate, so that they can be managed ahead of the autumn drilling.

In the month ahead, we can expect to see all the winter cereals being drilled and rolled. The soil is rolled to improve soil to seed contact to aid germination and also to compact the flints to avoid damage to equipment during next year's harvest.

Finally, we are pleased to be able to share with you some exciting news. A recent addition to the IIsley countryside is a vineyard, yes you heard us! Planted early this summer, we understand that it will produce its' first crop in 2023 - now isn't that something to look forward to? Local wine - Yum!!

In the next edition of the EIC we will discuss livestock and crop management. If you have a question that you would like answered - why not reach out to the editor and we will try to include the answer too.

To end with just a small reminder that farmland and farm machinery can be very dangerous, so please keep to the footpaths and adhere to the countryside code. Stay safe. Until next time.....

** For those of you with green fingers, OSR is a brassica and you will know the devastation the flea beetle can cause if not managed. Typically, a companion crop is planted alongside, this can take the form of buckwheat or mustard seed which grows quickly and confuses the flea beetle as it attacks the companion rather than the main crop, this is a much more environmentally agreeable solution than spraying harmful and expensive insecticides.

We'd welcome the opportunity to show you what's involved with no pressure to take part.

You do not need to be religious to become a bellringer. It opens the door to new friendships and we always visit the pub for refreshments after our Monday practices sessions.

Coronavirus (COVID-19) Update

The change on the 19 July 2021 on social distancing and the wearing of face masks, patients are still required to wear a face mask and observe social distancing in the practice. We need to keep the patients and staff as safe as possible. This situation meets current NHS Guidance and will be updated on the Downland Practice at the practice website news section when this changes www.downlandpractice.nhs.uk.

COVID-19 Vaccination Booster Clinics

We do not have confirmed dates for the covid-19 booster vaccination clinics, once we have information, we will update the practice website news section www.downlandpractice.nhs.uk . We are anticipating that the covid-19 booster vaccination clinics will take place in a central Newbury location and will be accessible for all of our patients who are eligible.

Flu Clinics - 2021

Flu clinics have been disrupted this year due to the flu stock deliveries being delayed. As soon as we have confirmation of the flu stock arriving we will plan flu clinics then. Normally our flu clinics are arranged well in advance of September, this year has seen the delay of the flu clinics. We did have a clinic running at the Royal British Legion in Newbury but we only had access to limited stock of the flu vaccine. Recently we had to cancel two days of flu clinics due to limits of flu stock. This issue is well outside or our control

Did Not Attend

We had an increase in did not attend (DNA) GP and Practice nurse appointments. These are important resources and directly affect patient care, so in an attempt to improve appointment availability we will be recording when patients DNA. Patients who DNA on multiple occasions will be contacted and asked if they wish to register at a GP Practice elsewhere. In our next patient update we will update on the numbers of DNA's we have had.

Duty Doctor

From the end of April 2021, the Duty Doctor system changed from telephone calls to face to face appointments. Patients who need to be seen on the day by a GP are given an appointment to attend the surgery. Patients may have a wait whilst the Duty Doctor deals with patients who have an urgent clinical need. Patients are advised to ring in before 12.00 if they wish to see a GP on the day. Patients who are offered a Duty Doctor Appointment but refuse the appointment will have this recorded in their medical records. This system is working well and is preventing GP's from having to use two appointments (telephone call, then a face to face) with the same

patient for on the day needs. The GP on the day appointments for patient with urgent concerns are for patients who need to be seen. Recently we have had patients stating they cannot be released from their work to attend their GP appointment. All employers have a duty of care to release their staff for medical appointments.

GP Routine Appointments

From June 2021 all GP routine appointments will be offered as face to face appointments. Patients will be sitting in socially distanced waiting area and when the waiting area is full patients will need to wait outside till there is space available. The checks in screens are now back in operation, please use the hand cleanser after booking in for your appointment. There are over five million people waiting to be seen in secondary care (Hospital referrals). This is placing a greater strain on all GP practices across England as these patients are still suffering from their conditions and need to see their GP. This issue has been well reported on the various media outlets, we will have a long winter ahead as the effort to reduce the patients waiting for secondary care may well be hampered by Covid-19 issues.

New Clinical Pharmacist

Bethan Davies has joined the team at the Downland Practice, Bethan previously worked as a Community Pharmacist but she is now working at the practice as a Clinical Pharmacist. The Clinical Pharmacist undertakes medication reviews for our patients, some of our patients will meet her in the new few months. The Clinical Pharmacist is freeing up our GP's so that they can offer patients longer routine appointments.

Nursing Team Update

We are looking at changing how we manage patients who are waiting to see the nursing team. This may mean that patients have to wait outside the nurse room for their routine appointment rather than waiting outside in a vehicle. We have recently experienced a national shortage of blood bottles; this has resulted in some non-urgent bloods being cancelled or delayed. Once this issue is resolved we will inform patients via the practice website news section.

PRESS RELEASE SOFO Museum Chairman Ian Inshaw steps down after 15 years

- Longstanding Chairman of the Soldiers of Oxfordshire Trust oversaw creation of Oxfordshire's only military museum.
- Major General David Shouesmith taking over as interim Chairman of the Trust
- SOFO Museum now looking to fill a number of Trustee and Volunteer positions



Brigadier Ian Inshaw DL, longstanding Chairman of the Soldiers of Oxfordshire Trust, has stepped down after fifteen years which has seen the creation and establishment of one of Britain's leading military museums in Woodstock, and the only such museum in Oxfordshire.

A career Army Officer, lan spent his last five years as Commander of the Bicester Garrison and on retirement joined the Trust to help create a new concept for a military museum: telling the stories of how conflict has affected the lives of people in Oxfordshire. Ian also held the position of Deputy Lieutenant of Oxfordshire

His time as Chairman brought together the strong military heritage of Oxfordshire which includes its two former County Regiments, the Queens Own Oxfordshire Hussars and the Oxfordshire & Buckinghamshire Light Infantry, and its strong links with the Royal Air Force and the US Air Force, and many components of the Royal Logistic Corps.

From early beginnings in 2009 Ian was committed to the creation of a museum that was attractive, unique, and sustainable. Today's purpose-built modern museum in the attractive grounds of the Oxfordshire Museum in Woodstock is his legacy; it is the result of his leadership and determination to ensure that the stories of Oxfordshire's soldiers, airmen and their families and communities should be accessible to all.

The Museum is once again open to the public after a Covid-enforced shutdown and the Trust's team of museum professionals have created an exciting programme of events for the year ahead.

The Trustees of the Museum have embarked on a search for Ian Inshaw's successor, and in the meantime, new Trustee Major General David Shouesmith has taken over as interim Chairman.

The Trustees are hugely grateful for Ian's unstinting passion and commitment to the museum and are delighted that Ian himself will continue to work with the Trust as a Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum Ambassador.

SOFO Museum Ambassadors are volunteers that also act as advocates for the museum, representing the museum at official events, or spreading the word within their own networks at corporate and personal levels.

HAMPSTEAD NORREYS WI (September)

What did you do in the war granny?

Was a question answered by Dan Allen at our September meeting. He told us about the little-known history of women serving in the first world war. Women served as stenographers, clerks, radio operators, messengers, truck drivers, ordnance workers, mechanics cryptographers and all other non-combat shore duty roles. The War Office realised that some front-line jobs which did not involve fighting were being done by men. They decided that women could do these jobs instead freeing up more men to go in to battle.



By 1917 the Army was running short of men because so many had been injured or killed on the front line. Many women volunteered to join the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps (WAAC) which was later renamed Queen Mary's Army Auxiliary Corps. There were also unsung groups of women who paid for their uniforms, equipment and even took their horses on to the battlefield to reach wounded soldiers meaning treatment was received much faster than waiting for stretcher bearers to take the wounded to field hospitals.

At this time, the first equal pay strike in the UK was initiated. This was led and ultimately won by women.

We learnt that granny was a force to be reckoned with!!!!

Survey into same day health care services - please take part and have your say

A major new survey has been launched to look at where people go to seek medical care for urgent, but not life threatening, health problems. It comes as the health service across Berkshire West resumes more 'business as usual' ways of working following the huge pressures put on it during the height of Covid.

Many health care services had to be adjusted to help medics deal with the pandemic and ensure people were treated safely. Some of the changes are set to continue as they have given patients more options on accessing a wider range of health care services. For example, the use of on-line and virtual consultations with a GP or healthcare professionals like Physician Associates, has made it easier and quicker for many people to seek reassurance and advice for a wide range of ailments from the most appropriate person. This way of working compliments the traditional face to face appointments with a healthcare professional which are still available where necessary.

The changes prompted by the pandemic have led to people seeking advice from alternative healthcare providers over the last 18 months and health managers are keen to understand where they went for same-day healthcare support, and why they chose this particular method. The information provided by the survey will help them direct resources in a more targeted way.

The survey outlines, and aims to raise awareness of, the wide range of healthcare options available including GP surgeries NHS 111 Online, NHS 111 Helpline, the hospital Emergency Department (A&E), minor injuries unit, pharmacists, and the walk in facility.

The walk-in service at the Reading Centre at Broad Street Mall has been temporarily stopped during Covid, and as part of the resumption of health services post-Covid, health officials are considering the future of the walk-in element and whether it is needed or whether the services it provided can be accessed elsewhere. They will use the findings of the survey to help them decide about the future of the walk in element of the Centre – patients registered at the Broad Street Mall surgery which is based at the Centre will not be affected by this and the surgery will remain open.

New service provides mental health support

The new 'Breathing Space' mental health support facility has just opened in Reading at Launchpad, Friar Street. It will be open during the evenings on each Friday to Monday and will offer short term crisis support.

The service will be run by the national charity Together for Mental Wellbeing working collaboratively alongside Berkshire West CCG, Berkshire Healthcare Foundation Trust, the local Emergency Services, Primary Care, and voluntary sector. Together For Mental Wellbeing are already commissioned to provide local services at Berkshire West Your Way so have a good knowledge and working relationship with a range of agencies in Berkshire West.

Visitors to Breathing Space will be helped to access community resources such as the recovery colleges or secondary care mental health services, and it is hoped this service will provide

better and timely support for people experiencing mental distress, as well as help ease pressure on the hospital's Emergency Department (ED) and other emergency services.

Winter vaccines

The NHS is gearing up to deliver the annual flu vaccination programme from autumn as it's the best protection against flu and its compilations. And it's more important than ever to get the flu vaccine this year if you're eligible, particularly as it is expected that this will be the first winter when Covid will co-circulate alongside the seasonal influenza virus.

The flu vaccine is free for older people, pregnant women, and those with certain underlying medical conditions.

As with last year, the offer of the free jab is there for 50 to 64 year olds. In addition, this year's programme has been extended to four additional cohorts in secondary school so that all those from years 7 to year 11 will be offered the vaccination.

Those eligible for the free flu vaccination on the NHS this year (2021 to 2022) are:

- all children aged 2 to 15 (but not 16 years or older) on 31 August 2021
- those aged 6 months to under 50 years in clinical risk groups
- pregnant women
- those aged 50 years and over
- those in long-stay residential care homes carers
- close contacts of immunocompromised individuals
- frontline health and social care staff employed by:
 - o a registered residential care or nursing home
 - o registered domiciliary care provider
 - o a voluntary managed hospice provider
- Direct Payment (personal budgets) and/or Personal Health Budgets, such as Personal Assistants.

Children aged 2 and 3 will continue to be offered the nasal spray by their GP and all school aged children will be offered it in school unless they have an underlying health condition. An alternative flu vaccine, in the form of an injection, will again be available this year for children whose parents decline the flu nasal spray due to its porcine gelatine content. Please keep a look out on your GP practice website for more information or visit the NHS website.

Covid Vaccination update

To date more than 75million people have had their Covid vaccination. You can book a first and second dose of the vaccine at a local vaccination site across Berkshire West. Go online to the national booking service or call 119 to make an appointment.

Appointments are being continuously updated to allow plenty of local choice and times, so please check regularly.

Quality of care for children & young people with SEND in Reading improving

The quality of care and support for children and young people with special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND) in Reading is improving, with leaders across the area working well together.

This is the inspectors' view following a recent joint Ofsted and Care Quality Commission (CQC) local area SEND inspection in Reading. The inspectors recognised that leaders have acted swiftly to address issues which affect children and young people with SEND in Reading and have a clear view of how they will continue to improve services.

The joint inspection took place between 21-25 June and involved health services and schools in the borough, Brighter Futures for Children and Reading Borough Council. Inspectors also spoke to children and young people with SEND and their parents and carers.



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
