Welcome to issue 108 of the EIC, the spring edition!

It has been a busy couple of months for the Parish Council since we last wrote for the Christmas edition. We have had a successful playground inspection with no repair work needed with the equipment. The fencing around the outside perimeter of the recreation ground is in need of some TLC, so we will be looking

to repair that over the course of the spring.

After a cold and wet meeting in the Swan car park back in January we successfully agreed our annual budget for 2022 / 2023 and the Precept request to West Berkshire Council. We also approved a temporary scheme of delegation to allow us to meet remotely again for certain meetings. This was implemented in the main to help the School whilst Omicron was on the rampage, but also for you and us in terms of meeting face to face. There are some things we are unable to do remotely but for most general business items, we are back on Zoom. It is up for review in May so we suspect we will be back in the School hall again in time for the annual meeting.

The great news is that the pond silt has finally dried up enough to be legally transported away for recycling at a plant in Reading. Huge thanks to lan Wilson for the extended loan of his field for the drying process. The weather hampered our efforts in mobilising it earlier but at last, the field has been returned. Fingers crossed it will be at least another 10 years before we have to worry about that again!

If you are out and about in the village at night you may have spotted some scary eyes watching you... we have teamed up with Keep Britain Tidy and their new campaign 'We're Watching You' to tackle the ongoing issue of dog waste on the pavements and footpaths. Dotted around the village are six 'glow in the dark' signs that remind you to 'scoop that poop' when you are walking your dog. It will be interesting to see how sucessful the campaign is... the signs are fully moveable so if you spot an area that could do with being 'watched' do let us know and we can adjust the positions of the signs. We would like to thank Brian Woodley for helping Fen master making cable ties longer on a freezing afternoon!



We are still a member down on the Council. Our 'Casual Vacancy' notice did not generate the need for a by-election so we are free to co-opt a new member to the Council. If you have lived here for more than 12 months, are on the Electoral Roll and over eighteen we would love to hear from you.

As we near the end of the financial year, the Clerk's workload will ramp up with the annual Year End processes and Audit, also we are attempting to put together an interesting and varied program for our Annual Meeting of the Parish in May. We have not had one since 2019 due to the pandemic so the plan is to make it an informative, useful and fun event, where we will lure you in with drinks and nibbles! Put the 10<sup>th</sup> May in your diaries, we would love to see you there.

Enjoy the edition, and we hope to see you at a meeting (either virtually or in person!) very soon.

### Your Village needs you!



To stand for election on a parish council, you must:

- ★ be a UK or Commonwealth citizen
- be a citizen of the Republic of Ireland
- be a citizen of another
   Member state of the
   European Union\*
- ★ be at least 18 years old

To be eligible to stand for an election for a particular parish, you must:

- ★ be an elector of the parish
- for the whole of the previous 12 months have occupied (as owner or tenant) land or other premises in the parish
- during the previous 12 months have worked in the parish (as your principal or only place of work)
- for the whole of the previous 12 months lived in the parish or within three miles of the parish boundary

If you do become a parish councillor you will have to sign up to the Parish Council's Code of Conduct.

#### Your route to becoming a Parish Councillor

Are you passionate about where you live? Do you want to help shape the future of East Ilslev? Read on to find out more...

East Ilsley Parish Council is an elected body in the first tier of local government, supporting the democratic process by holding Elections every 4 years. The role of the Parish Council is to represent the interests of the whole community they serve and improving both the quality of life and the local environment.

We are a corporate body, and a legal entity, separate from that of its Members, and are accountable to the local community. Our decisions are the responsibility of the whole body and are made collectively by a majority vote.

We have powers granted by Parliament, including the authority to raise money through taxation, known as the precept, and a range of powers to spend public money. We are an employer with our Parish Clerk working for, and with, the Council to action the decisions made.

Councillors are elected representatives, not volunteers or employees, and serve for a 4-year term, unless co-opted or elected in a by-election when they serve until the next election. They can be nominated by electors or approach us directly.

A Parish Councillor represents the views of all residents within the Parish and listens to, and understands, the views and needs of the differing groups within the community. As a Councillor, there is a responsibility to be well-informed, especially in relation to any diverse local views. Councillors cannot assume they represent the interests of electors without consulting them.

#### **East Ilsley's Jubilee Copse!**

To celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee the Parish Council are planting a 'Jubilee Copse' at the recreation ground. So far, three ornamental cherry trees were planted by Cllrs. Stephen Meadows, Mike Pembroke and Nick Watkins at the end of January. These trees were gifted to us by West Berkshire Council and the plan is to add more trees over the next few months.

We are hoping to be awarded a number of free trees by Greenham Trust as part of their 'Queens' Green Canopy' offering, later this spring, the clerk is keeping watch of when they launch the next allocation and will be putting in a request for a number of native trees. It is hoped that we can officially open the Jubilee Copse during the Jubilee celebrations in June with a plaque and even bury a time capsule there as well.

News from your West Berkshire councillor. Representing West IIsley, East IIsley, Compton, Hampstead Norreys, Frilsham and Yattendon

#### **Dear Residents**

On Wednesday 23 February the Compton Institute planning application was approved by the Western Area Planning Committee. The vote passed 4-3. I voted against the planning application because in my view it didn't give sufficient attention to the policies in the Neighbourhood Development Plan that was approved in a referendum only a fortnight previously.

These policies include the number of houses (they now have permission for 160 instead of 140), the retention and renovation of the hostel to provide one and two bed accommodation (they now have permission to demolish it) and the fact that the Pickled Pig/Piglets Day nursery building will be offered to the community for sale in its current condition with no guarantee there will be any money to buy, renovate and maintain the building.

I secured a condition that NO homes should be occupied until the fresh water and sewage infrastructure is updated to accommodate the additional flows. (Thames Water had proposed a phased approach where some of the site is occupied before upgrade.) It was still absolutely worth doing the NDP because it will help Compton in the long term. For example, when it comes to the protection of existing green spaces, the design of properties, etc. It also means that they will now get 25% rather than 15% of all 'community infrastructure levy' monies to spend in the community.

The applicant now has permission to demolish the site, but the government's Casework Unit is deciding whether the application should be called in by the Secretary of State. S/he uses this power pretty sparingly so we shouldn't get our hopes up that anything will change. When demolition of the site eventually begins it will take around 18 months. I raised concerns about the extra vehicle movements through East Ilsley - especially HGVs negotiating the narrow roads - so we will need to keep an eye on this as a community and report any problems to WBC when the time comes. I secured a condition that HGVs shouldn't be coming through the villages during school bus times. The full planning meeting is available to view on West Berkshire Council's YouTube channel search for Western Area Planning Committee on 23 February. I've called in the new sports hall at Downs School at the request of Compton Parish Council because, among other reasons, they are concerned that there is no mention of future public use of the gym facility.

On Thursday 3 March West Berkshire Council had its annual budget meeting. Council tax will go up by one per cent. All the Liberal Democrat and Green amendments (including money for the food bank) were rejected as usual.

Thank you to West Berkshire Healthwatch who visited again recently to offer covid testing kits and assisted testing to residents at Hildesley Court and Church Side.

On Thursday 17 March we will be holding a protest about Thames Water discharging sewage into our local rivers. 6pm at West Berkshire Council offices on Market Street.

My crisp packet collection (for recycling) service ends on 31 March. Terracycle will no longer be processing crisp packets because they can be recycled at most supermarkets. I've checked the list and they can definitely be recycled at Tesco, Sainsburys and the Co-op in Hermitage. You can report problems including fly tipping, unemptied bins, and pot holes by searching for 'West Berkshire Report a Problem' on the internet or visiting www.fixmystreet.com If it's urgent please email customerservices@westberks.gov.uk or call 01635 551111. If you are not happy with the response you receive please contact me.

Every week residents contact me about planning applications, road and verge management, waste and recycling, etc. I can't solve every problem but I always try. I can get information for you, identify a council officer who can help you, and hold the council leadership to account.

Volunteer Centre West Berkshire has recently taken delivery of a fantastic new Handybus, Jubilee. On the 2nd April, our team will be in Newbury town, giving you the chance to see our shiny new bus and find out about becoming a volunteer driver.

Our Handybus service provides regular transport for elderly and disabled people, mostly in and around Newbury and Thatcham, as well as one-off trips and excursions. We are always looking for friendly new volunteer drivers to ensure the continuity of this service on which so many people depend.

We are also looking for volunteer drivers for our car scheme in Newbury, which helps people who are unable to use public transport to get to essential appointments.

We will be located outside Marks and Spencer on Northbrook Street - please stop by for a chat if you would like to learn more about volunteering as a Handybus or car driver. We look forward to meeting you!

#### **Warehouse Volunteer**

#### **Agent Sonya - A Soviet Spy in Oxfordshire**

- Ursula Beurton, Soviet 'Agent Sonya', lived in North Oxford, Kidlington, Glympton and Great Rollright during the 1940s
- Speakers Professor Anthony Glees and Patrick Marnham

Join Professor Anthony Glees and Patrick Marnham and discover the Oxfordshire life of Soviet 'Agent Sonya'. Born Ursula Kuczynski, Agent Sonya lived in many places under many names, including nearby Oxfordshire villages of Glympton, Kidlington and Great Rollright as Ursula Beurton



She was described by historian and author Ben McIntyre as a 'lover, mother, soldier, spy' - but Anthony and Patrick will examine the question of whether she was really also a double-agent for MI6, or only ever gathered intelligence for the Soviet GRU (Main Intelligence Directorate).

Embedding herself in the local community, she was living on the doorstep of MI5 HQ; which was at that time located in Blenheim Palace to avoid the risk of wartime bombing in London.

She was twice awarded the Order of the Red Banner for her services to the Soviet Union, her spy work having sped up the development of Soviet nuclear weapons. On bike rides she would meet physicist and atomic spy, Klaus Fuchs, who was working on the development of the atomic bomb, so that he could secretly disclose details of his research.

Join us for this online talk and live Q&A as the full story of 'Agent Sonya' is revealed.

Anthony Glees is an internationally published expert on European affairs and Security and Intelligence questions. The author of numerous books and scholarly studies in this field, he is very frequently quoted in the national and international media, with recent appearances in the news providing commentary and analysis of the Russian invasion of Ukraine.

Patrick Marnham is a journalist, biographer and screenwriter. His biographies have covered subjects as diverse as Diego Rivera, Georges Simenon, Mary Wesley and French resistance figure Jean Moulin. His latest book, *War in the Shadows*, covers resistance, deception and betrayal in occupied France.

Prof. Glees also wishes to acknowledge the painstaking archival research undertaken by Dr Tony Percy which led to this story being told; it is his story as well Anthony's.

Those watching the talk on the night will be able to post their questions and get them answered live by Anthony and Patrick, but a recorded version of the talk will also remain available to view on the museum website indefinitely. Those wanting to watch again, or catch up at a later date, can do so using the same link as the live event.


SOFO Museum first opened during the summer of 2014, tucked away in the beautiful gardens in the grounds of The Oxfordshire Museum and Woodstock Library, and just on the doorstep of Blenheim Palace.

More than a local military museum, SOFO is a museum that everyone can enjoy, from kids to parents and grandparents. We tell stories of how conflict has affected the county and its people, from soldiers serving on the front lines to ordinary people living on the Home Front.

On top of a range of ever-changing displays and events, our permanent exhibits explore topics that you'll find surprising and moving in equal measure, such as raw accounts of the liberation of Bergen-Belsen from both camp survivors and Oxfordshire soldiers.

Battles of the Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry puts you on-board a Horsa Glider as it prepares to land in Normandy in the early hours of D-Day 1944, while Secret War explores the world of spies and espionage and lets you try your hand at sending and decoding secret messages.

SOFO holds a collection of over 3,500 objects and 7,500 archive items from two county regiments, the Queens Own Oxfordshire Hussars (QOOH) and the Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry. These are our starting point for reflecting on the county's rich and diverse military heritage.

We also plan to run so more craft sessions this time with an Easter theme.


Again, I would like to say thank you to all those members both on the committee and not who have put in so much help to keep the Group so vibrant.

#### **Downland News - Dr James Cave.**

I start this update with some bad news. Dr Ben Curtis, who has been a partner for over 10 years will be leaving us in July. Ben is looking to have a change in career, and we wish him well. There will be a book at reception in Chieveley later in the month if you wish to leave a few words for him.

Which brings me onto another piece of bad news. Sanjay Desai, our pharmacist has resigned. We are very sorry to see him go as he was instrumental in improving both the pharmacy and the dispensary. We have started the recruitment process and, in the meantime, will continue to run dispensing at both Chieveley and Compton. However, there may be days when we are unable to find a locum pharmacist, and this will seriously impact on our service. Just like GPs there is currently a shortage of Pharmacists too!

We are pleased to welcome Dr Tosin Akin-Komolafe, Mike Essery and Debbie Green to the team this month. Dr Akin will be taking on most of Dr Haider's work. Many of you will have met her before as Tosin has worked for us in the past. Mike is a paramedic with decades of experience and joins us to help with the demand for on the day urgent appointments. He will work with the duty doctor in dealing with all our on the day demand. Our commitment to see anyone that feels their problem is urgent on the day has become increasingly difficult. In the last 6 months one in 7 days on average have seen the duty doctor struggling to see over 40 patients. (The BMA suggests that seeing over 35 patients in a day is unsafe). The stress of duty doctor is a major factor in GP burnout, and we are hopeful that Mike's intervention will take off some of that heat. We still ask people to think about their needs carefully and consider taking advice from online sites such as NHS.UK, other healthcare professionals (such as Pharmacists) or a trusted friend/family member before calling for an urgent appointment. Debbie Green is a very experienced senior nurse who will be joining us to fill the gap left by the retirement of Meryl Peckham.

#### **Immunisations**

The last year has reminded us of the power of vaccinations in preventing serious disease. Perhaps it is time to remind ourselves that there are still other diseases out there that can be prevented by immunisations. In 2021 over 150 admissions to hospital were caused by diphtheria, mumps, measles, and whooping cough. Now many of you are old enough to remember the days before we had vaccinations and will recall "measles parties". What we forget is that in the 1960s about 6000 children died each year from measles. In addition to the short-term impact of these diseases- which can all be fatal- several of them can leave people damaged after the infection. In the case of German Measles (Rubella) an infection during pregnancy can cause deafness in the unborn child.

Over the coming months we plan to revitalise our immunisation program particularly focusing on the following:

- MMR vaccine (Measles, Mumps and Rubella).
- Pneumococcal vaccine (protects against pneumonia).
- Shingles vaccine.

If you receive a reminder from us in the coming months for a jab, please don't ignore it. I know you may be tired of having a sore arm, but it might just save your life!

#### February 2022

#### **COVID Restrictions are still in place**



Although Covid restrictions within England have now ended, most NHS premises will still ask patients and visitors to stick to the 'hands, face space'. This is to comply with infection prevention and control guidance while Coronavirus remains in circulation. The Royal Berkshire Foundation Trust's hospital sites will continue with these guidelines to prevent Coronavirus spreading.

Individual GP surgeries have the option to do the same, so please check what arrangements your surgery has in place.

#### Vaccine Walk-in Sites

Our Health on the Move van is still supporting the Covid vaccination programme by visiting locations across the Berkshire West area that don't have their own vaccine centre. You can get a dose of the Covid-19 vaccine from a walk-in site or the Health on the Move (HOTM) van, without an appointment, and you don't need to be registered with a GP.



#### **Current Situation at the Royal Berkshire Hospital Emergency Department**

Like most of the NHS, the Royal Berkshire Hospital's Emergency Department is currently under extreme pressure. Please remember that unless it's a medical emergency, calling NHS 111 or visiting 111.nhs.uk may be the best port of call to get the care you need.



#### **Team Effort to Reduce Ophthalmology Waiting List**

Trusts across Buckinghamshire, Oxfordshire and Berkshire West have been working together to treat patients who have been waiting the longest for cataract, squint and ocular plastics surgery.

Earlier this year, the Royal Berkshire Foundation Trust completed 315 additional cataract, corneal transplants and squint operations in just two weeks. These procedures were carried out across three Trust sites: the Prince Charles Eye Unit in Windsor, the West Berkshire Community Hospital in Thatcham and the Royal Berkshire Hospital. As a result, the number of patients waiting longer than 18 weeks has reduced to just 31 patients - largely due to lack of donor material.

The Trust set up 'one-stop cataract clinics' so that most patients were able to be diagnosed, and prepared ready for surgery in a single visit. They also arranged for patients to have their post-operative checks carried out with community optometry practices. All of this work was helped by switching patient records to a fully digital system, providing greater flexibility and allowing the Trust to treat patients at whichever site has capacity.

#### **Covid Test Payment Scam**

Now that the Government has announced that free Covid tests will be coming to an end on 1 April 2022, please be aware of a related scam where people are receiving text messages requesting payment for Covid tests.

A person recently targeted by fraudsters reported that they had received a text message requesting payment for Covid tests. Given the recent news that free tests are coming to an end, the targeted person clicked on the link in the text. The target then received a phone call purporting to be from their bank, advising of suspected fraud and the need to protect their accounts. The caller advised the target to check the telephone number that they were calling from against their bank website to prove that the call was genuine. The target did check their bank's website, and confirmed that it was the same phone number calling them. However, the caller, who was a fraudster had cloned the bank telephone number when making the call.

Fortunately, the target became suspicious and ended the call. They later reported the incident to their bank who told them that this was a known scam.

#### **Building Berkshire Together - Join the Hospital Redevelopment Project**

In 2019 the Royal Berkshire Hospital was announced as one of 48 sites across the UK that was selected for the Government's New Hospital Programme. We have submitted our Strategic Outline Case, and while we await feedback to progress to the next formal stage, we have devised a range of options to either redevelop or relocate the main site of the Royal Berkshire Hospital, which we plan to evolve further to reach a preferred option.

We have established a small Building Berkshire Together team, led by Programme Director, Alison Foster to work on developing the options with patients, carers, staff and the local community. We would love you to join our network and be part of the team to design the hospital with us.

We will be looking for people from across the community to be involved as much or as little as they wish, either with a general interest in the hospital or those with specific skills. # Extracts from WBC Leader's Report for February 2022 West Berkshire Council

#### Council

There was no Council meeting in February - the next meeting is on Thursday (3 March) and will deal only with the WBC Budget for 2022/23 (see below). There will be another full Council meeting on Thursday 17 March to deal with non-Budget matters.

#### **Executive**

The Executive met on 10 February and, as well as dealing with public and Members' questions: Approved the West Berkshire Domestic Abuse Safe Accommodation Strategy 2021-23; Endorsed the Newbury Town Centre Masterplan; Approved the West Berkshire Local Flood Risk Management Strategy 2022-2027; Noted the 2021/22 Revenue Financial Performance Quarter Three

The next meeting is on 24 March.

#### 2022 Updates to the Highway Code



At the end of January, the Highway Code changed, with changes implemented to improve safety for people walking, cycling and horse riding. Every road user still has a responsibility to keep themselves and each other safe, and the changes mean being ready to give priority, leave space and be considerate of others.

In summary, irrespective of your method of transport, a new hierarchy of road users has been introduced to ensure those who can do the greatest harm have the greatest responsibility to reduce the danger or threat they may pose to others. This means:

- Giving people crossing and waiting to cross, and cyclists going straight ahead priority when turning in and out of junctions
- Giving plenty of space when passing people cycling and horse riders
- And making sure drivers are acting with responsibility and respect to all road users

#### Appeal for return of unused equipment

Anyone with equipment on-loan from the NHS or Adult Social Care that is no longer needed (beds, hoists, commodes, etc) is asked to get in touch to arrange a collection.

Returned items are cleaned and re-issued, which helps to reuse and recycle - saving money, and ensuring that necessary equipment is available to more patients so they can be discharged from hospital safely.

### West Berkshire Co-production Steering group for Environmental services

- An interest in learning from other people



#### Musing from the associate clergy's desk



The last two years have been a trial for us all, when we are reminded each day on the news of the number of people who are ill, the number of cases in hospital and finally the number of deaths from this virus. Hopefully it encourages us to be more careful in what we do, where we go and remembering always to carry a face mask with us.

However, it also points to the fact that we are mortal and that death can come at any time, whether we are young or old. I mention all this, not because I feel depressed, or to

make you depressed, but because the Christian hope is to look to the future.

I am sitting writing this at the beginning of February, as I look towards the church period of Lent beginning on Ash Wednesday, March 2nd - the time when we have an opportunity of examining our own lives, and hopefully, seeing where we can improve not only in our daily living but also in the way we can help others. Jesus often reminded his followers that there are two commandments - love God and love your neighbour. How good are we at doing this day by day?

As far as I am concerned there are many ways in which we can fulfil Jesus' teaching to love, but for me one of the most important is through prayer. He also taught us how to pray by setting out the words of the Lord's Prayer - the Our Father.

This brings me to something positive - each Lent we hold a Lent Course on one subject or another, and this year the subject is very apposite - what we can learn from the words of the Lord's Prayer and how to put them into practice in our own lives. There are five Sessions in the course called 'Come and See' and it gives us an opportunity of exploring the Christian Faith in a small group, of asking questions that we have long thought about, and perhaps, been too shy to ask, and contributing to the general discussion.

Certainly, this will be a positive way of using Lent as a time of reflection. There will be three or four groups held each week in different parts of the Team, and you will be reminded of these nearer the time. I hope and pray that through this course God will help us all to understand our faith more easily, and to live it out more fully in our daily lives as we continue to face the remnant of this pandemic.

So 'Come and See' what we can learn together, and practice in our lives each day.

#### An invitation to journey with us through Holy Week

On Palm Sunday we remember Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem by receiving a palm cross and in some churches there may be a procession. (Read Mark's gospel, chapter 11)

On Maundy Thursday we remember Jesus' last supper with his friends and the altar is stripped in recognition of the humiliation Jesus suffered at his arrest. A service of Tenebrae (which means shadows) includes readings and the extinguishing of candles, ending in darkness. It recreates the sense of abandonment and betrayal that Jesus felt at his arrest. A vigil offers quiet time for personal reflection and prayer. (John, chapter 13)

On Good Friday services include the story of Jesus' death on the cross and offer stillness to reflect upon the story. Easter walks and trails help to remind the world of the significance of this day. (Mark, chapters 14 and 15)

On Easter Sunday we celebrate the glorious resurrection of Jesus Christ, it is the most joy-filled day in the Christian calendar. Alleluia, Christ is risen. He is risen indeed, Alleluia! (Mark, chapter 16)


