We listened to that feedback and, after a successful pilot in Hampshire and Isle of Wight, we are very excited to have started the rollout of our new **Knowledge Hub** - developed with funding from the National Lottery Community Fund.

The Knowledge Hub is an online platform available to Neighbourhood Watch volunteers across England and Wales. It offers induction, training, support, and other resources to help our volunteers in their roles.

Within in the Hub is a forum for volunteers to share advice, support and experiences with each other.

We have had some fantastic feedback from those already using the Hub.

We know many of our Coordinators are keen to access the Hub, but if your area hasn't yet been invited, please be patient - you'll receive an invitation when we're ready for you.

#### Our actions spoke louder than words

The **Summer Seminars**, which we ran last month, attended by 318 volunteers and partners, inspired our volunteers to do even more within their communities with the theme **ACTIONS SPEAK LOUDER THAN WORDS**.

We listened to our **Coordinators** speak enthusiastically about how they engage their communities through working in partnership with the police and running local activities attractive to young and older residents.

We were thrilled to hear from two of our partners, **Co-op and Deliveroo**, on how our national partnerships continue to grow from strength to strength. Our joint projects, such as the annual *Neighbour of the Year Awards* and the newly launched Deliveroo Rider Community Safety Training Programme, are supporting more communities to be better connected and safer.

Attendees welcomed the opportunity to communicate with other volunteers in workshops on: proactively promoting diversity and inclusion; attracting a younger demographic; supporting vulnerable people; and changing the perception of Neighbourhood Watch. Our diversity and inclusion workshop looked at age, socioeconomic status, political views, gender, ethnicity, religious beliefs, types of resident and disabilities.

One Coordinator said, "I thought I live in the most un-diverse Borough in London, but listening to what has been said, I live in a very diverse community." She realised almost every diverse category was covered within her one small, leafy, green, suburban street, and a street party would be a great way of connecting over food, drink and activities.

Participants said they valued hearing about 'the forward-looking approach that was clearly conveyed' and described Neighbourhood Watch as 'a progressive organisation.'

With over **91%** of participants rating the seminar as good, very good or excellent, and **70% feeling more positive** about the organisation, we are ready looking forward to welcoming even more volunteers to Summer Seminars 2022!

#### Airbnb's new high risk reservation technology to crack down on UK parties

Following Airbnb's launch of the UK Trust and Safety Alliance last month, Airbnb in the UK is launching high-risk reservation technology to help combat parties and other neighbourhood disturbances.

This technology will enhance Airbnb's ability to block attempts to book stays that could present high risk of certain types of disruptive parties, and help stop them before they start. This considers a number of factors in relation to certain reservations, including the date and duration of the booking. These measures build on party prevention tools and policies already deployed in the UK, and will enable Airbnb to further prioritise efforts to try to stop parties before they start.

This launch comes one year on from the introduction of a separate pilot restriction that prevents under 25-year-olds without a history of positive reviews from making certain bookings in specific circumstances.

New data from this pilot shows that in the past year, Airbnb has blocked or redirected reservation attempts from nearly 375,000 people in the UK, France and Spain. That includes potentially disruptive reservation attempts from nearly 84,000 people in the UK (approximately 23,000 people in London, nearly 2,000 in Edinburgh and Bristol, over 1,000 in Cardiff, nearly 600 in Brighton and nearly 200 in Bath).

#### Fraud reporting trends

While fraud reporting decreased from 54,845 to 50,187 during June, City of London Police's July monthly Fraud Threat Assessment identified types of fraud that were increasing or commonly featuring during the month:

- Passport application fraud
- **Lottery scams** victims are contacted by phone or social media messages, notifying them they are on a 'winners list' or have won a lottery cash prize or other prizes. Fees are required to obtain winnings, or the victims are asked to purchase vouchers.
- **Rental fraud** increase is potentially due to restrictions easing and the association to holiday rental fraud and individuals and groups renting properties, e.g., students.
- Door to door sales more people at home, fewer restrictions for suspects.
- **Application fraud** criminals using false information or counterfeit documents to apply for a financial product.
- **Driving license renewals** websites purporting to offer driving licence renewals requesting victims input their personal and financial information.
- Crypto mining scams victims were persuaded to invest and promised daily returns, but no returns were received, and the website has since been closed.
- Covid tests ordered from a website purporting to be on the governmentapproved list of suppliers, but victims reported never receiving the test or the results despite payment being taken.
- Vaccine passport scam emails
- Fake emails purporting to be from Amazon claiming to offer an exclusive reward if the recipient completes an online survey, but it is a phishing email designed to steal login, personal and financial information.

**Looking ahead:** The most vulnerable could be offered a booster Covid-19 vaccine from September 2021 to protect as many as possible from becoming seriously ill due to Covid-19 over the winter period. There is the potential for cybercriminals to target vulnerable or older adults who are eligible for the vaccine.

#### **Building sustainable communities**

We are delighted to be partnering with Thirteen, a charitable housing association providing housing and support services, regeneration and social value work across the North East of England, including Cleveland and Yorkshire. Thirteen share our aspiration to build neighbourhoods with a sustainable community and reduced crime and antisocial behaviour.

We are working with Thirteen, Middlesbrough Council, and residents to develop a Neighbourhood Watch in an area of Middlesbrough that has suffered from high crime and deprivation, where residents have not previously engaged with Neighbourhood Watch.

John Hayward-Cripps, CEO of Neighbourhood Watch Network, said: "We are very excited to be working with Thirteen. Together we aim to develop a way of working that better involves people from the community and gives them more of a say in how they can best engage with and benefit from the support that Neighbourhood Watch can provide to the area."

"We have started by sharing local knowledge between the agencies about the issues affecting the area. We are engaging residents through surveys, community events and focus groups to understand what their community concerns and interests are, and how we can work with their skills, knowledge and experiences to support building a safer more connected place to live for all."

Angela Corner, Thirteen's Head of Community Resilience, added: "Thirteen's strategic priority is to create quality places to live and to improve our neighbourhoods and we can't do this alone. We must put the communities at the heart of what we do and work with partners and experts who can help deliver on our ambitions. This partnership is a perfect example of how we will work with others to develop community led, sustainable projects. We are really excited to be working with Neighbourhood Watch on this project and once evaluated we will be looking to roll this out in other communities."

#### 'No excuse' approach needed to gas safety in our homes

We all can be guilty of making excuses to get out of or put off doing things we know we should be doing, with avoiding household chores the top reason for excuse-making.

New research from Gas Safe Register - the UK's official registration body for gas engineers and gas businesses – highlights that one in three of us have used excuses to get out of having our home gas appliances safety checked, despite the majority saying we would never make excuses if our loved ones' safety was at risk.

Yet, the latest inspection figures from the safety body demonstrate just how real these risks are and why excuses aren't worth making. Nearly **7 million homes** in the UK – one in four – now house potentially dangerous gas appliances, including boilers, cookers and gas fires. If left unchecked, these faults can pose a threat to life from gas leaks, fires, carbon monoxide poisoning, and explosions.


This is why we're partnering once again with Gas Safe Register for this year's **Gas Safety** Week, running from 13th - 19th September.

This Gas Safety Week, they are urging all householders to get into the habit of booking an annual safety check with a registered engineer, and to become familiar with the signs and symptoms of unsafe gas appliances.

#### Top tips for being BETTER GAS SAFE THAN **SORRY**

- 1. Learn the six main symptoms of carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning - headaches, nausea, dizziness, breathlessness, collapse and loss of consciousness and teach them to others, including your neighbours. Unsafe gas appliances can put you at risk of CO poisoning, gas leaks, fires and explosions.
- 2. Check your and your neighbours' gas **appliances for warning signs** that they are not working properly e.g. lazy yellow flames instead of crisp blue ones, black sooty marks or stains on or around the appliance and high levels of condensation in the room.
- 3. Fit an audible carbon monoxide alarm. This will alert you if there is carbon monoxide in your home.
- 4. Have all your gas appliances safety checked every year by a Gas Safe registered engineer - sign up for a free reminder.
- 5. Only use a Gas Safe registered engineer to fit, fix and service your gas appliances. You can find and check an engineer at GasSafeRegister.co.uk or call 0800 408 5500. Check their Gas Safe Register ID card look for the yellow triangle.
- 6. If you suspect carbon monoxide poisoning, get some fresh air and leave the house as quickly as possible. See a doctor and if you are very unwell call 999 for an ambulance. The National Gas Emergency Helpline is also available 24/7 on 0800 111 999.




#### Tell scammers to SLING THEIR HOOK

In July we ran an online campaign encouraging people to tell scammers to SLING THEIR HOOK. We looked at the psychology around why people fall victims to scams to help people protect themselves against the huge number of scams that are happening every day.

Our campaign, which targetted people in Leicestershire, Greater London, West Midlands (incl. Birmingham), Essex and Greater Manchester, reached over 200K people on social media. It raised awareness of the tactics scammers use, and encouraged people to 'stop and think' if something doesn't FEEL, SEEM, LOOK or SOUND right.

Alongisde our activity on social media we ran five successful webinars with guest speakers on protecting yourself from scams - two of which were recorded and are available to watch from our website here.
