Re Ilsley Farm Barns, the councillors had a separate meeting with James Dawson and have decided to **not** change their position of 'No Objection' to WBC. Their reasons being:

Following on from the Councillors meeting on Wednesday 31st July with Beeswax Dyson to further discuss the proposed development of Ilsley Farm Barns it has been decided that they will <u>not</u> be amending their original decision of 'No Objection'. The Councillors were satisfied and pleased that many of the issues raised have been addressed, in particular the restriction on rolling doors to reduce the number of HGV vehicles and the amendment of opening hours. We continue to express our keenness to increase the length of the 30 mph zone up past the junction to maximise safety of residents and employees of the site and this includes the improvement of sight lines at the junction. We will continue to work closely on this development with Beeswax Dyson to ensure the amendments are adhered to.

The traffic data collection will be added to the new proposal.



Hi everyone, I'm Fen, the relatively new Parish Clerk for East Ilsley Parish Council. I took this role over from the lovely Moira who left for pastures new on 1st May and I can't tell you how much I am enjoying this role!

For those of you who don't really know what I do, well, I hold two posts in this position, as Clerk and Responsible Finance Officer. I am a professional officer, working for East IIsley Parish Council serving your community. The health and well-being of your community is at the heart of everything I do. I advise the council on legal matters. I administer the council's finances. I organise the council's

procedures. I gather information to help the council make decisions. I raise the profile of the council in the local community. I guide the council as it engages with its residents. 

St Mary's in the Community/East IIsley Community Project

In the last edition (Issue 95), you were promised that we would keep you advised of the progress we have made since the Village Survey results in late May.



Several residents have agreed to

help co-ordinate our fund raising suggestions -Quiz Night, Car Boot, Farm Produce as examples. We were successful in our Waitrose (Newbury) Community Matters bid and received the highest total in June of £403, which, when match funded by The Good Exchange, will double.

Our second grant application was accepted by the John Lewis store (Newbury) for July and August and we are hopeful for another good grant (thanks to customer generosity). Our Tesco Grant Application is on hold until planning permission (a faculty) is approved to begin urgent window and roof repairs on the Church building. Our total funds raised to date is £26,000 thanks to individual gifts, grants and fund raising etc. Another stream of income comes from the Gift Aid scheme, whereby HMRC will refund 25p in each given £1 – provided the donor is a basic taxpayer. HMRC has also approved of our Charitable Status which means we can reclaim VAT on any works carried out on the Church Building. One last point is that our funding agent, the Good Exchange, has matched our initial target of £5,000, which moves us onto the next grant level of £45,000 to be achieved by 2020. So, our plans for fund raising are progressing -but any support you can offer to help us organise and fund raise would be much appreciated.

We would like to thank all our generous supporters and who knows, you might even see some scaffolding around St Mary's.

Back in February, the Fair Close Centre in Newbury was packed with people who had braved the miserable weather to come together to discuss how to tackle loneliness and social isolation across West Berkshire. There was real passion in the room, lots of good ideas and a combined desire to get something done. Since then, the challenge for all of us has been to build on the momentum and earlier this month, I was invited to see a particularly inspiring example in action. Under the energetic leadership of 'Captain Karen' from the Methodist church, the three churches in Lambourn had got together, along with East Garston Quakers, to take any older people who might not be going away on holiday this summer on a 'cruise' on the 'SS Lambourn Valley'. The Walwyn Hall was transformed with bunting and portholes and an action-packed itinerary was organised for the twoday trip to 'France' and 'Spain'. So many local groups, individuals and businesses contributed to the success of the day, helping in kind or in cash, a great example of community cooperation. As I'm sure you are already aware, the Department for Transport finally gave the go-ahead for safety improvements on the A34. Works start next month and will include better signage on Gore Hill, improvements to the East Ilsley northbound slip road and to laybys north of Chieveley. This has been a long hard slog and I am delighted that something is finally being done. However, as anyone who uses this road will know, there is still more to do. The current works were seen through the financial prism of the proposed Oxford to Cambridge Expressway and I am working with England's Economic Heartland and with Transport for the South East as they look at the wider connectivity of the new route to make sure that our concerns about its impact are fully understood.

Lastly, a little plug for Greenfest, the sustainable living event being held in Hampstead Norreys on Saturday 7th September. Another fantastic example of a community-led event which promises to inform and inspire. And, yes, I am on the Q&A panel so come along and find out more!




Front Cover:- This Editions front cover is up on Green Hams Lane, looking down on the village, on Sunday afternoon.

East Ilsley 100 years ago (extracts from Newbury Weekly News)

17th July 1919

PETTY SESSIONS – Friday 11th July before Mr. E.J. Wasey and Mr. H.C. La Grice, Frank Pocock of Easton was charged with stealing a bicycle valued £2 10s., the property of Mr. Charles Eacott of East Ilsley. He pleaded "not guilty". Prosecutor stated that Pocock borrowed the bicycle on 5th April, and did not return it, in spite of repeated applications by letter. He heard that Pocock had sold the bicycle, so he went to Easton, and found that the bicycle had been sold to a blacksmith for 17s. 6d. James Radbourn stated that Pocock offered to sell the bicycle and he gave him 17s. 6d., for it. Defendent said he had no intention of stealing the bicycle; he did not realise the seriousness of the matter until he heard he was summoned. The Chairman told defendant that he had been a fool, but on account of his previous good character the Board had decided to deal leniently with him; he would be fined £3.

PEACE THANKSGIVING - Remnants of the old army, new armies, Special Constables, V.A.D., W.R.A.F., paraded at the Square on Sunday evening, the 6th inst., and marched to the village church to offer thanks to God for their safe deliverance and for a victorious peace. Many of the good old fighting regiments were represented, including our own county regiment which has fought in so many valiant fights and received the praise of our commanders. No less than 41 were on parade, and included men and women who had served with the following units: Royal Berks, Wilts, Hants, Devon, Warwicks., A.V.C., R.H.A.,R.F.A., 9th Lancers., A.O.C., Dorsets, L.N., Lancs., Lincolns, Beds. R.A.S.C., Berks Yeomanry, West Kent, V.A.D. and W.R.A.F.., and a good array of war medals and ribbons showed the good fighting qualities of those on parade. The arrangements were ably managed by R.S.M. Sneller A.O.C. met at the church door by the rector Rev. Canon Whitham, they quietly took their places in the pews allotted to them. The church was crowded and the hymns were rendered with great enthusiasm. The sermon also was listened to intently. After the service "Our Heroes" fell in and marched back to the Square where the dispersal took place.

23rd July 1919

On Saturday last, the day appointed for the celebrations of Peace, the anxieties and troubles of the past five years appeared to entirely vanish. Rejoicing was the order of the day. The first thing noticeable was the flag flying in the old church tower. It is some time since the flag has been seen owing to the breaking of the flag-staff, but it floated gaily in the breeze on Saturday. There were also numerous other flags and bunting about the village. During the afternoon, the children assembled at the school, several of the elder children in fancy dress. They formed up and marched round the village singing patriotic songs, and eventually arrived at the old schoolroom where they were entertained to a substantial tea. The church bells were now ringing a merry peal. At six o'clock a programme of sports was carried out in Mr. Lowe's meadow. The events included races for children of all ages, mile handicap, walking race, baby competitions and beauty show. Rain came and marred the pleasure of the sports, and the finale of the rejoicings, bonfire and fireworks was postponed until Monday night. On Monday, at 8.30 p.m., a fancy dress and comic dress masquerade paraded the village. Prizes were given for the best dresses in each class, and the rejoicings terminated with a bonfire and fireworks on Liddiard's Hill.

14th August 1919

GIRLS AND BOYS AT CRICKET.

An enjoyable cricket match was played at East Ilsley on Saturday, August 9th, between the girls and boys of East Ilsley School, and resulted in a win for the boys by two runs. Tea was kindly provided by Mrs. Risien. After the match the captains of both sides joined hands and with the Union Jack hoisted well, sang"Rule Brtiannia." Scores:

Hopefully you are all aware of the Downland Volunteer Group, the DVG, which has been in existence since the early eighties. It was set up to help residents in the Downland villages who had problems attending appointments at the hospitals in our area, the surgeries and dentists. We have a team of some 40 volunteer drivers using their own cars to drive the patients to their appointments.

In recent years we have also managed the day to day running of the Handy bus service by recruiting volunteer drivers for this vehicle and scheduling trips mainly to the Newbury shops but also to Wantage. The Handy bus was owned and maintained by the West Berks Council. As part of their re-structuring and cost saving plans they have requested that the local charities, like the DVG, take over full control of the Handy bus service. From the beginning of April the DVG will be fully responsible for the servicing, maintenance, safety checks plus tax and insurance of the vehicle. It will become our property and we are expected to fulfil our obligations to the Community Transport Services.

This twelve seater Mercedes bus makes schedule trips on certain days from the main villages in the area. Whilst it is ideal for older residents, anyone can travel on the Handy bus, although it is not equipped to carry children. It is particularly useful for anyone temporarily incapacitated and unable to drive or carry shopping. For just £3.00 return the passengers are driven to Newbury, either Sainsbury's or Tesco's, the driver will load up their shopping and will even carry it to their front door. The difference between the Handy bus and a normal bus service is that you would need to book yourself on to it in advance- a bit like a taxi service! Bus passes cannot be used on the Handy bus.

We believe many more people could benefit from the Handy bus service. We need to increase passenger numbers and we will not raise the £3.00 fare this year and hope that with grants and sponsorship the Handy bus service will be a non-profit but self-financing operation in the near future. Motor Neurone Disease

My name is Clive Jones, a retired priest living in Compton, and assisting in the Hermitage Team.



My wife dies 18 months ago from cancer – about which we hear a great deal, and for which there are numerous appeals for funds, - but very little is heard about **Motor Neurone Disease** and it's terrible effect on the individual and family.

In Compton we have a young man suffering from MND who is gradually getting weaker, and whom I visit each week with the Sacrament – and my mission is to make people aware of this illness, and to raise money for the **Motor Neurone Disease Association.**

My grandson mentioned sky diving recently, and I thought that this would be a great way of raising awareness of MND and funds for the association.



Appeal for the Repair of the Bells at St Mary's Hampstead Norreys

As many of you will be aware the bells at St Mary's have been silent for last two to three years. This is because they are now unsafe to ring and require significant repairs to be carried out prior to them being declared safe to ring once more. The total repair costs are estimated at about £60,000.



MASS EXODUS

I don't want to sound like an ice cream salesman telling everyone that 'dairy' is bad for you or a used car salesman telling everyone to travel by bus but my topic is so important that I'll take the risk. My summer reading this year has included a new book by Stephen Bullivant, Mass Exodus, (OUP 2019). It blazes a trail – which others are following – looking at the collapse of Catholic Mass-going on in Britain and America during the last fifty years. The focus on the West is crucial: similar books could be written about the Catholic Church growing like wild-fire in Africa, China, and other parts of the world. So, where are we now? In America only 15% of cradle Catholics claim to attend Mass weekly. In Britain it is only 13%. 35% of American cradle Catholics no longer tick the 'Catholic' box on forms and 37% of British cradle Catholics now would describe themselves as having 'no religion'. The rise of the 'nones' has been startling. In fact Professor Bullivant himself, nowadays a committed Catholic and Professor of Theology and the Sociology of Religion at St Mary's University, London, came to Oxford as an undergraduate as a 'none'. The book is disturbing and fascinating and what it describes would make sense to Christians other than Catholics. Anglicans, Methodists, Baptists: all have seen a fast diminishing membership.

In Mass Exodus, Bullivant does not offer any ways forward for his beleaguered coreligionists, though, as a believer and a sociologist, he is working on the topic. In a way, it is good to look at the collapse and see it for what it is. It is the collapse of a particular culture, a particular way of life. Millions still belong to this culture – even in the secular West – and, contrary to urban myth, scientists are just as likely to belong to it as they were a century ago. It's not that Christianity has been shown to be false. In fact it is more that people have ceased to pass it on routinely and share it on a family basis. Many children now are not baptised, nor brought up with 'the greatest story ever told', as we used to call it. It's just that church-going is no longer part of the warp and woof of everyday life as most people live it. We mustn't overstate the case: even as numbers fall, most people in this country would still describe themselves as 'Christian' and many would point to particular Christian values as important. Caring for those in need. Treating others as you would want to be treated yourself. The importance of individuals and their human rights. Is our culture 'going to hell in a handcart?' Probably. But we're no longer into 'group think'. Increasingly individuals make up their own minds on these issues, and many have decided conscientiously not to join the Mass Exodus.


