East Ilsley Parish Council News - October 2019

We will be creating a community orchard on the old allotments soon, thanks to funding from East Ilsley Parish Council, East Ilsley Trust Fund and West Berkshire Council. Steve Meadows and I have met one of WBC's tree experts who is helping guide us about the layout of the orchard and the mix of trees. The trees will improve the appearance of the land and will attract pollinators, which will benefit the allotments. It's 'National Tree Week' in the last week of November so that is when we hope to make a start. I will keep residents updated on Facebook.



The parish council and West Berkshire Council will also be funding some emergency kit to help us if/when we have flooding in the village. Altogether I've been able to secure £1,658 for East IIsley from WBC.

On Monday 28 October WBC will be holding its first climate conference, to discuss how it can become carbon neutral by 2030. The council declared a climate emergency – like many other councils – in July, and are now committed to the 2030 deadline.

There will be a public engagement event about the future of the Institute site in Compton between 12.30pm and 8pm on Thursday 7 November at the Wilkins Centre behind Compton Village Hall. Up until recently the understanding was that there would be no more than 140 new homes built on the site, but the current owners Homes England and their consultants are proposing 250. I have spoken to the WBC planning officer dealing with this application, asking about the implications for traffic, the doctors' surgery and local schools. I will maintain contact with him throughout the process. Please take the opportunity to attend this event to find out more and give your views.



The parish council and I tried to get the speed limit over Sunrise Hill extended but WBC said no. I understand the parish council are going to give you more detail about this in their article. Regarding salt bins, I've decided to leave this with the six parish councils in Ridgeway ward to resolve, because I'm being batted back and forth with no resolution in sight. I have come to the conclusion that I cannot

WBC to fill the bins, ordering salt from another source, or not filling them at all and leaving it up to residents to make their own arrangements (for example in Compton one cul-de-sac club together to buy their own salt). So sorry I haven't been able to solve this personally, but it's up to parish councils to decide what their policy is. I can't tell them what to do.

Flood Warden:- We still desperately, desperately need a flood warden. The Parish Council thought they had found someone to replace the previous one, but it was not to be.

This is very urgent! I lot of you may have seen a lot of water rush into the village already this year in mid-September and mid-October. The likely hood of the village flooding if it we have a prolonged spell of rain is very high. We have already had warning this year. I can't really emphasis how important and serious this can be. I think back in 2014 due to the knock on effect of the flooding someone died!

If it does flood like it did in 2014, a lot of you won't be able to get out the village (or in) and you could also sustain water damage, and not always in the most obvious ways. Sorry for the rant, (I do care) it's just very frustrating to watch a situation that you know can be avoided get worse.

Whoever takes over the Warden position, you won't be alone. I and other people in the village will help clear any reeds or water ways that need clearing, we just need someone with a bit of knowledge and motivation to organise the management of the flooding in the village.

Tales from your Parish Council – Issue 97

Welcome everybody to this latest edition of the EIC!

Since the last edition we find ourselves reminiscing on the blue skies and sunshine of summer whilst looking out of the window at dark, grey, rain filled clouds ever threatening to overflow. The central heating is back on, log burners are stocked with dry logs and kindling, and we are forever watchful of the pond and the weather forecasts!

With this in mind, and the view from my window today we'll start by telling you all about where we are with the pond. As you know, our duck pond plays several vital roles in East Ilsley village. It is of course home to several ducks and other pond species but primarily it is there to provide flood alleviation to the village. With heavy rainfall, various channels and water courses throughout the village use the pond as a place to deposit their collections of water which in turn should reduce the risk of flooding to premises and properties in the village. However, the rather enormous caveat to that is that it absolutely must 'work' and function in that fashion to do an effective job! This is a massive undertaking and one that we simply can't do on our own. We need cooperation from key stakeholders in the village (landowners etc.) and homeowners with 'Riparian Responsibilities' to the water courses. We also are in desperate need of a Flood Warden. Sadly, no one has come forward since Steve Coleman stepped down in May and with more rain on the way in the coming months, finding someone in the Village who can take on this role really is most pressing. If you think this might be for you or know of someone who would be interested, please contact the clerk at clerk@eastilsley-pc.gov.uk and she will let you know what you need to do.

Several Parish Councillors and landowners met with Stuart Clark who is the Principle Engineer at West Berkshire Council in the Flood Management Department on 16th October down at the pond to look at what is most in need of doing to ensure it functions properly over the autumn and winter. Stuart will prepare a report which we hope to receive in time for our next Parish Council Meeting on 19th November so do add to your diary as we will discuss this in the meeting. One of our main problems seems to be the increase in silt in the pond which in turn has made the pond shallower resulting in it potentially overflowing into the road and surrounding areas. However, according to Stuart, this is not something that needs to be auctioned immediately so with his guidance we will make a start on clearing that next year which should give us a deeper pond, capable of coping with heavy rainfall and not overflowing. The next task will be to clear the reeds but the best time to do this is in July (according to the Pang Valley Flood Forum group) so we will also be ready to action that next year. What we can do now though is to clear the main gully that runs along Haydon Lane by the Old Rectory so we will make a plan for a 'Community Action Morning' where we can all don some wellies and get stuck in with some tea and cake as well. More information will follow on that shortly.

We don't want to dwell on the thought of floods, but we have received some good news from West Berkshire Council regarding some grant applications that our District Councillor Carolyne Culver put in for us. The first is that we have been awarded grant assistance for

the purchase of our own 'Emergency Equipment'. This grant will enable us to buy some important pieces of kit that could help the village should we find ourselves in a situation. Kit like generators, pumps, emergency lighting, portable heaters, hi-vis jackets, first aid kits, gas burners and kettles and flasks will be purchased and kept in the village for use by all, when needed. We hope to have all this wrapped up in December and the team are working on obtaining quotes and suppliers to maximise our funding and stretch it as far as it can go. We have also been successful with our bid for the Community Orchard funding and our District Councillor will be working alongside us to work out where best for the trees to be placed. Look out for more information on both these developments on our website and social media. A huge thank you to Councillor Culver for putting these bids in for us and helping us move forward with these projects.

Councillor McGrath is moving forward with plans for the playground on the recreational ground. He now has a small army of volunteers that are helping him with grant applications and funding, and we are very grateful to all the volunteers who are giving up their time to help. He is keen to make our park amazing and there are lots of conversations with suppliers happening in the background. We hope to have things ready for the start of next summer, so things are really ramping up!

The Super Six Speed Squad are now all trained up and are working with West Berkshire Council on where best to start their data analysis. Once risk assessments have been carried out you should start to see the team out and about with their Happy / Sad face sign. They are now a rolling agenda item at all our Parish Council Meetings so do come along and hear about what they are getting up to.


One recent bit of news is that Councillor Sharp attended the Speed Limit Review meeting at West Berkshire Council Offices as the Cow Lane / Sunrise Hill 30mph zone request was on the agenda. Sadly, our request to increase the 30mph zone up to Sunrise Hill was rejected on the grounds of 'No more signs' are wanted in the countryside. We are very disappointed.

<u>St Mary's in the</u> <u>Community/East IIsley</u> <u>Community Project</u>

Further to **Issue 96** Progress report, there are several new matters to let you be aware of. Concerning our fund raising efforts, we have just been advised that our Community Matters Grant bid with John Lewis (Newbury) has been



concluded, resulting in a grant of £845.00 (thanks again to Customer Generosity) which, when match funded by the Good Exchange, will double. Our Tesco bid is still awaiting Planning Permission (a faculty) from the Oxford Diocese, before the Newbury store will consider promoting St Mary's Church Building in its bi- monthly token scheme. We are just about to apply to HMRC for the past 6 months of Gift Aid Rebate, which is from donations at our Services' collection plates.

So our current total raised stands at £27.000, and we are now planning to prioritise the essential works to the fabric of the building. These Grants cannot be used for maintenance but targeted towards ensuring the building is starting its conversion into a Community useable asset.

Electrical rewiring, heating system, toilet and kitchen facilities, disabled access, and reconfiguring the pew stalls are still to be tackled. Several Fund Raising schemes are being planned over the next 6 months, starting very shortly with a 'SWISH' sale of nearly new , but not needed clothes, kindly organised at Ian and Francesca Wilson's home 'Melcombe House', Stanmore Rd on Thursday 14th November 2019 – there is more information in this Issue. A couple more events are planned for around Easter and we'll let you know the details in the next EIC.

We would appreciate any help in any way you could offer to keep the momentum going for Fund Raising for St Mary's in the Community. The Church Notice Board has the contact details displayed at the approach to the Church entrance.

#GiveADayToPolicing

MPs across the country were invited to **#GiveADayToPolicing** this summer and, amidst all the current chaos and confusion of the political scene, it was salutary to take a day out with the neighbourhood team in West Berkshire. The aim of the initiative was for MPs to see how day-to-day business is managed and how frontline officers respond to daily calls and challenges and, reporting to Newbury Police Station that morning, I was allocated to join PC Greg Jones and PC Shaun Bull for the day.

Over my years as MP I have been fortunate to go out several times with the police and, once again, I was really impressed with the professionalism shown by these two officers. Calls that day took us out to a traveller incursion, a domestic dispute, and a minor traffic incident in Hungerford High Street. I was impressed by how intelligently the officers handled some very sensitive issues.

The role of the local copper has changed out of all recognition. Our police are expected to take on community engagement and safety as well as law and order and public protection. In West Berkshire, for example, it is our local Superintendent Lindsey Finch who chairs the group working with our most vulnerable rough sleepers. The police are also part of the Homelessness Strategy Group and pop in regularly to Two Saints hostel, the Newbury Soup Kitchen and Loose Ends, as well as visiting schools and liaising with Parish Councils and other community bodies. TVP's Rural week of action in October saw an extra focus on crimes such as illegal coursing and stolen vehicles that plague rural areas such as the Berkshire downs, as well as a 'have your say' event in Compton, several firearms training sessions and a tool and tack security marking event.

The Government has pledged funding for 20,000 more police officers over the next three years and of the first tranche of these in 2020-2021, 183 new officers will be allocated to the Thames Valley force. This comes on top of the additional 209 officers and support staff funded by the increase in the Council Tax precept agreed in January.

Whereas the timing of the next general election is subject to much speculation but at the time of writing is as yet unknown, an election will definitely take place on 7 May 2020 for the next Police and Crime Commissioner for the Thames Valley. Anthony Stansfeld, the current PCC for this area, is standing down and candidates to take his place are due to be confirmed. There has been a lot of talk about the role of PCCs who now head up policing in around 40 areas across England and Wales. But, replacing the old police authorities, they are, if you like, our voice, acting as the link between the police and the public, and between the police and the Government, and have real power – deciding the precept and hiring and firing the Chief Constable.

I have wholeheartedly recommended **#GiveADayToPolicing** to all my colleagues.



Introducing SID....More Than Just A Smiley Face!

Do you think there is an issue with traffic speed in our village? If so, please tell us more and omplete our short (2min) survey by following this link:

Over the summer a small team of villagers attended training with West Berkshire Council which means that we are now able to use SID (a portable **S**peed Indicator **D**evice) to assess the speed of traffic passing through East IIsley. We've worked closely with East IIsley Parish Council and West Berks Council to review one existing site for SID and expore possibilities for other places where SID could be deployed.




SID is the first step in a series of interventions which can be made by West Berks Council in areas where the speed of traffic is perceived to be a problem. Although SID will not enable us to issue penalty notices or 'catch' speeding drivers it will collect a lot of really useful information which will help us to identify if there is an issue with speeding traffic, where the speeding issues occur, what times of day speed issues are most likely and from where the speeding traffic originates.

What else can we do right now?

- We can report incidences of speeding traffic directly through West Berskhire Coucil's website and following the road safety links.
- We were advised during the training that homemade speed signs, although well intentioned, are actually not always helpful because motorists are actually using them to **AVOID** speeding charges in court. This happens because drivers claim they were confused by the additional signage, which doesn't have the correct permission or adhere to road safety legislation so, even where a speeding offence has occurred, it cannot be enforced.

The Ilsleys have already had a busy but exciting start to the new academic year. The children (and teachers!) all had a wonderful summer break and are ready to learn in their new year groups and classes. It has also been a pleasure to welcome the new pupils to our school who look so smart in their uniforms and have settled in really well already.

At the beginning of the term, our school and Hampstead Norreys (who we are federated with) had a really special day. The Mini Marines came to visit and brought a huge obstacle course with them! The children all got to have a go on this as well as learning how to light their own camp fire and taking part in other problem solving challenges. 
East Ilsley 100 years ago (extracts from Newbury Weekly News)



25th September 1919

IMPORTANT PROPERTY SALE AT ILSLEY

On Wednesday last, acting on the instructions of the trustees of the estate of the late Mr. W. H. Woodhouse, a sale by auction was held by Messrs. Dreweatt, [Watson and Barton], when various properties were submitted. A businesslike company assembled, and although not extraordinary large in numbers, it was soon evident that business would be transacted.



Lot 1. – Comprising a cottage, known as "Windmill House," situate on the road from East to West Ilsley, and being the site of the old Windmill landmark, now unfortunately a ruin, together with $4\frac{1}{2}$ acres of land, attracted several competitors, the bidding commencing at £150, and the lot being secured by Mr. Webb, of Reading, at a sum of £215.

Lot2 – One and a half acres of arable ground, close to Lot 1. Was bought by the same buyer, at £30. Lot 3. – A Freehold field, of 4½ acres of arable land in Blewbury Bottom, approached by a long bridle track, and having a tithe upon it of £1 19s. 6d., was bought by Mr. Bartholomew, at £50.

Lot 4. – A small paddock on the outskirts of the village, occupying very high ground and on the top of a very steep incline, was bought by Mr. Booker for £42, and it seems to us that if there was a bargain sold at the sale, this was it.

Lot 5. – A two-bedroomed cottage and garden, was bought by Mr. Sneller for $\pounds 62$ 10s.

Lot 6. – The adjoining cottage and garden was sold to Mr. Webb, at £100.

Lot 7.- A row of four very small cottages and gardens was secured by Mr. Henry Wilson, at £150.

Lot 9. – The fully licensed inn, known as "The Star," with [pl----] meadow used as part of the Fair Ground, created very considerable competition, being put up at £500 by Messrs. Strange, the tenants, and bidding did not cease until it was secured by Mr. Webb, of Reading.

Lot 10. - The small residence occupied by Mr. Booker, at a rent of £16 10s. together with a cottage, let at 3s. a week, and some stabling, of which the roof had fallen in, was bought by the tenant at £355.

Lot 11. - A row of three very picturesque half timbered and thatched cottages, producing a gross rental of $\pounds 16$ 15s., and affording very restricted accomodation, were bought by Mr. Booker for $\pounds 80$.

Lot 12. – Three cottages known as "Trilby Cottages," and "Melcombe House," were bought by Mr. Wilson at ± 250 , while lot 13, a small cottage on the Compton Rd., was sold to Mr. Barclay for ± 20 .

For Lot 3, which comprised the most valuable part of the sale, viz., "The Hall," there was no bid of any kind. This beautiful house, excellently built, which, although it has been empty for something like seven years, shows no ill-effects therefrom, seems to fail to attract anyone, and it is a loss to the village that this should be the case. The owners were disposed to accept a very small sum for this extremely nice house, together with the five cottages which go with the lot, and it is to be hoped, for the sake of the village, that the buyer will be found at an early date. It is to be sold at an absolute bargain, and to anyone whose inclinations draw them to country village life, we are inclined to believe there is no similar bargain going in the country in these times.

By instructions of Mrs. Larkin, another property, comprising the detached house known as "The Firs," was also offered, but the biddings did not reach the reserve, and it was withdrawn, but was disposed of immediately after the auction.

A small cottage, situated in the centre of the village, occupied by Mr. Bartholomew, was also offered, and this realised £75.

The sale, which was conducted by Mr. Barton, took quite a short time to complete, and the result seems to go to show that there is life in Ilsley yet.

<u>10th October 1919</u>

BAZAAR AND CONCERT. - The Baptists of East Ilsley and the district churches held their annual bazaar and concert on October 8th and 9th. The whole proceedings were a gratifying success. The sale was held in Mr. Baker's showroom, transformed with colours in flags and flowers. Mrs. S. Brown, of Woodley, opened the sale. Mr. S. Brown made a pleasant speech. Rev. T. G. Fairbairn, B. A., and Mrs. Fairbairn, and Mr. E. Jackson, were present from Reading. A busy time followed, some of the stalls being cleared by tea-time. Hopefully you are all aware of the Downland Volunteer Group, the DVG, which has been in existence since the early eighties. It was set up to help residents in the Downland villages who had problems attending appointments at the hospitals in our area, the surgeries and dentists. We have a team of some 40 volunteer drivers using their own cars to drive the patients to their appointments.

In recent years we have also managed the day to day running of the Handy bus service by recruiting volunteer drivers for this vehicle and scheduling trips mainly to the Newbury shops but also to Wantage. The Handy bus was owned and maintained by the West Berks Council. As part of their re-structuring and cost saving plans they have requested that the local charities, like the DVG, take over full control of the Handy bus service. From the beginning of April the DVG will be fully responsible for the servicing, maintenance, safety checks plus tax and insurance of the vehicle. It will become our property and we are expected to fulfil our obligations to the Community Transport Services.

This twelve seater Mercedes bus makes schedule trips on certain days from the main villages in the area. Whilst it is ideal for older residents, anyone can travel on the Handy bus, although it is not equipped to carry children. It is particularly useful for anyone temporarily incapacitated and unable to drive or carry shopping. For just £3.00 return the passengers are driven to Newbury, either Sainsbury's or Tesco's, the driver will load up their shopping and will even carry it to their front door. The difference between the Handy bus and a normal bus service is that you would need to book yourself on to it in advance- a bit like a taxi service! Bus passes cannot be used on the Handy bus.

We believe many more people could benefit from the Handy bus service. We need to increase passenger numbers and we will not raise the £3.00 fare this year and hope that with grants and sponsorship the Handy bus service will be a non-profit but self-financing operation in the near future. <u>Motor Neurone Disease</u> Sky Dive for Motor Neuron Disease



It was a rather wet morning when I left my house at 6.30 a.m. on Thursday, September 26th to drive to Old Sarum, where the Sky Dive Company was situated. When I arrived at 7.45 a.m. the weather was beginning to clear, as had been predicted by the company in an email the evening before, and as the morning opened out, so the weather improved and the sun began to shine.

After booking in, we had to wait until we were called, to fit us out with the 'overall' and the various belts, straps, etc. that had to be worn. During this time Richard, my son, and his family arrived, together with Jonathan's parents, with two friends, his sister and her son, and a parishioner from one of the parishes in the Team.

When all who were 'diving' were kitted out, we were called to go through a rehearsal of how to leave the plane, and how to land, before waiting to be called for our flight. I was attached to a young man - Mac, who was very friendly and helpful with his advice. Eventually we went onto the plane, Mac and I leading the way. We sat on




benches each side of the plane, with our legs on each side of the bench, making it easier to slide towards the door when the time came. While taking off, Mac tightened our straps, etc. as he was sitting directly behind me, and I was sitting in his lap, ready for our jump. We were 7 pairs in the plane, plus my photographer, the door opener, and the pilot. As I had volunteered to do the highest jump at 15,000 ft - we were the last to leave the plane. Our photographer was hanging onto the plane outside, filming us, as our legs came over the edge, until we jumped. The first mile was a free fall, when I am told, we fell at 123mph but I soon felt the tug of the parachute and we were able to float in the sky. It was an amazing feeling seeing the earth below - Mac pointed out the English Channel, the Isle of Wight, and immediately below us the layout of Old Sarum castle and the first cathedral, and a little further over Salisbury itself, with the cathedral looking like a toy building. The photographer at one point floated over to

us and shook hands with us in mid air. Mac handed me the two control chords of the parachute and we were able to do the twists right and left. What struck me was how quiet it was - we could hear each other talking quite clearly. Eventually the time came to descend gradually, landing exactly in the marked circle on the ground.

What a fantastic experience it was - something I had never dreamt I would do - but it was well worth it, as not only have we been able to familiarise people with the work of the Motor Neuron Disease Association, but also have helped to raise money for its work - at present getting on for £7,000. It was an important way of thanking MND for the care they took of Jonathan and his family, and also to make it's work better known in our communities. The Appeal and the 'Just Giving Page' will close at the end of October.

Lastly, I would like to thank you all for the money you contributed in sponsoring me for this Sky Dive in memory of Jonathan and for the MND Association. May those who are doing research into this terrible disease soon find the cause and the cure. God bless you all and thank you. Clive Jones

Monthly Musing from the Vicar's Desk – Reverend Rob Wynford-Harris

'Remember, RE-MEMBER'

I am writing this article in October – well before the much-advertised 31st October 'Leave' deadline, so have no way of knowing if, when this article is published, our nation will be more divided or less divided than it currently seems.

The month of November is one in which past conflicts and divisions are reflected upon and remembered yet somehow given a sense of coming together for healing, celebration and hope.

The 5th of November sees families and communities throughout Britain coming together not to celebrate and jeer at the failure of Guy Fawkes and co-conspirators to Murder King James I and to blow up the House of Lords in 1605; but rather, to delight in human creativity and shared experience through spectacular fireworks displays. If you attend such a display this year, you won't be asked what your faith is to gain entrance, nor what your political views or social background may be. 'Bonfire Night' crowds these days are wonderfully diverse, yet everyone seems to say 'Wow!' or to 'Oooh! And Ahh!' in unison.

In Remembrance Sunday (this year on the 10th November) civil ceremonies and church services up and down the country we express sorrow at the loss of life in conflicts throughout the world ever since the first Armistice Day of World War 1. At such events we give thanks for all those, living and dead who have offered their lives in the service and defence of others. These services also remind us to be hopeful, yet vigilant against present and future voices which seek to divide and destroy. Often at these services, one-time-enemies stand side by side to honour each of their fallen. We come together not to re-open old wounds, but to share in present and future healing.

'Re-membering' isn't simply an act of reflection upon the past; it is a present gathering-together. It is a recognition of our common humanity in which we are all members, and it is a re-unification.

Isn't it striking that central to Christian life and worship there is an 'act of remembrance'? – The Eucharist or Holy Communion in which we recall and re-enact the Last Supper. Jesus instructed his disciples (and so us) to "Do this in remembrance of me". We come together as brothers and sisters to share Christ together through bread and wine. All are invited to remember in this way, regardless of race, creed, political view, sexual orientation or gender, because we are all one in Christ.

Jesus initiates this inclusive Communion just before his own death upon the cross. From that cross, with the voices of conflict and division, hatred and fear all around him, Jesus retaliates in startling fashion: "Forgive them! For they do not know what they are doing"

On the cross Jesus becomes the antidote to all the evil, hatred and injustice perpetrated by humanity, - taking all that is wrong with us deep into himself and giving back nothing but Love Mercy and Forgiveness. In this way, Jesus Re-Members US, draws us together as uniquely created human individuals who are united in community, and each loved by God. 'Remember, Re-Member'







Prepare your home for winter – energy efficiency grants and collective switching news from West Berkshire Council

Heat the Home Counties Energy efficiency grants

A consortium of councils (Bracknell Forest, Royal Borough of Windsor and Maidenhead, Runnymede, Spelthorne and West Berkshire), in partnership with The HEAT Project and Happy Energy Solutions Ltd are working together to make homes healthier, warmer, and more energy efficient. Grants are available towards measures such as boiler upgrades, central heating systems, insulation, and renewable energy systems.

Central heating grants funded by the consortium's successful bid to the National Grid's Warm Homes Fund; are also available. These are for households who currently have no heating, such as open fires or plug in electric heaters, or those who wish to switch from electric storage heaters to a full radiator heating system. Grant funding can also be provided towards the cost of a new mains gas connection, or, in rural areas, the new heating system can be fuelled from LPG, and in some cases, by a ground source heat pump.

You may be eligible for a grant if your household income after tax, Council Tax and energy costs is less than £35,000 per year, or if someone in your household receives benefits. Residents looking to take advantage of any of these grants can call Heat the Home Counties on 01344 888930, or go to <u>www.heatthehomecounties.org.uk</u>. All works are subject to survey, eligibility criteria and limited funding.

West Berkshire Energy Switch - See if you can pay less for your energy bills

The West Berkshire Energy Switch is a free to join scheme which gives residents the chance to see if they can make savings on their fuel bills.

Since 2016, over 630 households have switched supplier through the scheme, saving over £144,000 between them. The recent May auction saw switchers saving an average of £174 on their annual bill.

A one day reverse auction will be held in October; with suppliers competing with their best offers, and the winning supplier/s then sending registrants their personalised offer for consideration. Auctions are held each year in February, May and October.



Friends and Family Test (FFT)

The FFT was introduced across the NHS in 2013 as a result of the Francis Report that had looked into NHS standards of care for patients. The FFT replies for the Downland Practice from April to September have numbered 1147, this figure is around 10% of our registered patients. The results of the FFT state that 95% of the patients of the Downland Practice would recommend the surgery to their friends and family. On behalf of the Downland Practice staff, please accept our thanks to all of the patients who have sent in comments for the FFT (mainly by text message).

Flu Season 2019/20 Update

The flu season is well underway, we believe that this year the structure and approach to the flu clinics has been much smoother and less rushed. The practice do have flu clinics for patients to book into, but if for any reason patients cannot get in to see the practice nurse or HCA for a flu vaccination they can pop in and see the pharmacist at the Downland Pharmacy and have a flu vaccination with Sanjay Shah. If you are already entitled to a free NHS flu vaccination then the pharmacist will give you the flu vaccination free of charge.

Stay Healthy this Winter

Winter will be here soon so the advice from the NHS is to follow the five ways to stay healthy this winter. Further information can be obtained from this link <u>https://www.nhs.uk/live-well/healthy-body/five-ways-to-stay-healthy-this-winter/</u>

a. Banish winter tiredness – Get outdoors in natural daylight as much as possible, get a good night's sleep, de-stress with exercise or meditation, stress has been shown to make you feel tired. Wrap up well with a coat, hat, scarf and gloves to prevent you from getting cold.

- b. Eat more fruit and veg The dark and cold nights can make it tempting to fill up on unhealthy comfort food. Swap sugary treats for fruits such as clementine's, winter vegetables such as carrots, swede and parsnips can be roasted and mashed or made into soup for a comforting winter meal for the whole family.
- c. Drink more milk You are more likely to get a cold in winter so make your immune system stronger with milk and dairy products, Protein, Vitamins A and B12, Calcium (to keep bones strong) are all in dairy products. Use semi skimmed milk or skimmed milk and low fat yoghurts.
- d. Try new activities for the whole family Don't use the cold weather as an excuse not to get out, try a bracing winter walk on the beach or a local park. Physical exercise helps control your weight and boosts our immune system
- e. Have a hearty breakfast Winter is the perfect season for a bowl of porridge to start the day off, it also helps boost your intake of starchy foods and fibre. These food help give you energy and make you feel fuller for longer. Make your porridge with semi skimmed milk or skimmed milk or water, don't add sugar or salt, add a slice of banana or throw in some berries and other fruit for extra flavour, this will help you hit your five a day target for your intake of fruit and vegetables.

Patient's Behaviour on the Telephone

All telephone calls are recorded at the Downland Practice, recently there have been some badly behaved patients who have been aggressive and bullying in their approach to the reception team. The reception team have been given training to deal with these patients, but patients who are overly abusive to staff will be reported to the police and may be removed from the practice list

Practice Appointments

Please be punctual for your appointment at the Downland Practice. Patients that arrive late may be required to rebook their appointment at a later date. Please inform the practice if you are running late so our staff can make clinicians aware and aim to accommodate your appointment, where possible. At times the appointment system will be running late as patients can present with urgent conditions that need the Doctor or Nurse to spend more time with a patient due to their condition, this may involve transferring the patient to care outside of the Downland Practice (999 ambulance). Patients waiting in the waiting room for appointments will be informed of any delay. The Doctors operate a *'Sit and Wait'* clinic, this clinic is the duty doctor's afternoon clinic and is used for on the day access. Patients may have to sit and wait whilst the doctor is dealing with their case load, patients attending this clinic may benefit from bringing a book or magazine whilst they wait to see the doctor in the waiting area.
